## STATISTICAL ABSTRACT, 1966 <br> PREFACE

This publication is the thirty-fifth issue of the Statistical Abstract. The Abstract includes not only statistics collected in pursuance of statutory powers, but also a considerable amount of statistical matter which arises in the ordinary administrative work of the several Departments of State. It may be said to contain references to practically all official statistical data available.

Each year when the tabular matter is being prepared for publication, the various Departments are approached for amendments to figures furnished for previous years and for suggestions regarding fresh material for inclusion in the next issue.

The Abstract is divided into thirteen sections and an appendix as follows:-

An analysis of the figures contained in the tables, together with charts and diagrams for the interpretation of the more important statistics, will be found at the beginning of each section.

Maps of meteorological data appear on pages 6 and 7 and acknowledgment is made to the Director, Meteorological Office, London, for permission to use in their preparation information supplied by him. The information published in previous editions of the Abstract has been revised where necessary and brought up-to-date and some new tables have been added. Attention is directed to pages xvi and xvii on which are given the sources from which the various tables have been obtained.

The Appendix containing certain published data relating to the Six Counties comprises tables dealing with Population, Vital Statistics, Agriculture, Industrial Production, Trade, Labour, Education, etc. With each such table is given a cross-reference to the table in the body of the Abstract which contains the corresponding data for Ireland (exclusive of the Six Counties). Care must be taken in relating the figures, as the basis and coverage is not always the same in each case. In this connection attention is directed to the notes and sources of the tables at the beginning of the Appendix.

The Office is indebted to other Departments and Offices for their collaboration and for the suggestions which have been made from time to time.

Note.-The area referred to as Ireland in this Volume is to be interpreted as meaning Ireland exclusive of the Six Counties.

# Section II. Numbers and Distribution of the Population 

with particulars of Births, Marriages and Deaths.

The Preliminary Report of the Census of Population taken on the night of 17 April, 1966, showed a total population of $2,880,752$, compared with $2,818,341$ in 1961, representing an increase of 62,411 or 2.2 per cent. This increase is in sharp contrast with the falls in population which occurred in the two preceding intercensal periods, and which amounted to 79,923 between 1956 and 1961, and 62,329 between 1951 and 1956. During the forty years 1926 to 1966 an increase in population was recorded at only one other Census, namely that of 1951, and on that occasion the increase amounted to only 5,486 persons. Prior to that of 1951 , each Census taken since 1841 had shown a decrease in population for the area of the State, and it is necessary to return to the period 1831 to 1841 to find a greater increase between Censuses than that in the most recent intercensal period. The increase in population between 1961 and 1966 was confined to the provinces of Leinster and Munster. The population of Leinster rose by 80,316 persons or 6.0 per cent, while the population of Munster rose by 9,539 persons or 1.1 per cent. On the other hand, the population of Connacht declined by 17,947 persons or 4.3 per cent, while that of Ulster (part of) declined by 9,497 persons or 4.4 per cent. The falls in population in Connacht and Ulster (part of) between 1961 and 1966 were, however, considerably less than those in the preceding intercensal period, which had amounted to 6.0 and 7.8 per cent, respectively. The substantial increases in population in Leinster and Munster contrasted with falls of 0.5 and 3.2 per cent, respectively, between 1956 and 1961.

In Leinster, increases in population occurred in all except four Counties, namely Kilkenny, Laoighis, Longford and Westmeath, the decrease in the last mentioned County amounting only to twelve persons. The population of Dublin County Borough, which declined between 1951 and 1961, showed a substantial rise, amounting to 30,823 persons or 5.7 per cent, between 1961 and 1966. The population of Dun Laoghaire Borough, which had shown almost no change from 1951 to 1961 , rose by 3,979 or 8.3 per cent. In the portion of Dublin County excluding Dun Laoghaire, there was a very substantial population increase, amounting to 40,656 persons or 30.5 per cent. Dublin County, excluding Dun Laoghaire, was the area of greatest population growth in the two preceding intercensal periods as well as in the period 1961-66. The boundary of Cork County Borough was extended in 1965. The population within the newly defined boundary of the Borough increased by 8.7 per cent between 1961 and 1966. Waterford County Borough was also extended, with effect from 1 April, 1966, but it has not been possible in the time available to compile separate population figures for the added area and, accordingly, the relevant figures in this report relate to the area of the Borough as defined prior to the recent extension. The population within this area increased by 5.1 per cent between 1961 and 1966. Limerick County Borough also increased substantially, namely by 10.0 per cent, in 1961-66. Except for County Kerry, which decreased in population by 3.3 per cent, the Counties of Munster showed little change in population between 1961 and 1966. The small reduction in population in County Clare, amounting to only 163 persons or 0.2 per cent, is particularly noteworthy in view of the fact that the two preceding intercensal periods showed decreases of 5.1 and 4.5 per cent, respectively, in this County. Fairly substantial declines in population occurred between 1961 and 1966 in all the Counties of Connacht and Ulster (part of), although these were generally well below the declines observed in the two preceding intercensal periods. The biggest reductions in rates of decline occurred in County Galway and County Monaghan. In County Galway, the fall in population was 1.1 per cent in 1961-66 compared with 3.6 per cent in 1956-61. In County Monaghan, the fall in 1961-66 was 2.9 per cent compared with 9.6 per cent in 1956-61. County Leitrim, on the other hand,
showed very little reduction in the rate of fall of population; the decline in population in 1961-66 was 8.8 per cent compared with 9.7 per cent in 1956-61. The position in County Mayo was slightly better, the decline in population in 1961-66 being 6.3 per cent, compared with 7.3 per cent in 1956-61. In the remaining Counties of Connacht and Ulster (part of) the declines in population between 1961 and 1966, although substantial, were well below the level of those which occurred between 1956 and 1961.

Population figures for the 1961 and earlier Censuses in respect of towns with 1,500 inhabitants or over are shown in Tables 9 and 10. The compilation of figures for town populations presents a number of difficulties. In the case of towns without legally defined boundaries it is necessary for the Census authorities to define the precise areas to be enumerated as towns. In the case of towns with legally defined boundaries it frequently happens that the built-up areas extend considerably beyond these boundaries, so that the Census authorities must define suburban areas or environs. A thorough examination of these problems was made in connection with the 1956 Census and for a full account reference should be made to the report of that Census(a). In examining trends in town populations the position is greatly complicated by changes in town boundaries (both legally defined and defined for Census purposes), from one Census to the next. In Table 9 figures are shown for comparable areas for each census from 1881 to 1951 ; it is not possible to compile 1956 Census figures for these areas. In Table 10 is shown the total population of each town (including suburbs or environs, if any, of towns with legally defined boundaries) which had, in 1961, a population of 1,500 or more. In the case of some towns the suburban populations are fairly large in relation to the populations within the legally defined boundaries, while in others the legally defined boundaries include practically the entire built-up areas.

In the intercensal period 1961 to 1966 the number of births exceeded the number of deaths by 146,266 while the total population increased by 62,411 . The difference between these two figures, which is 83,855 , represents the net emigration during the period. Changes in population, natural increase and net emigration for each intercensal period since 1881 are shown in Table 6, while corresponding rates per 1,000 average population are shown in Table 7.

In Table 12 the distribution of the population by age group according to the 1961 Census is compared with the results for the censuses 1881 to 1951. Considerable changes in the numbers in certain age groups occurred between 1951 and 1961. The number of children aged under 15 years rose from 854,810 to 877,259 , that is by 2.6 per cent. Persons aged 15 to 44 years decreased in number from $1,214,583$ to $1,027,089$ or by 15.4 per cent. Persons aged 45 to 64 years rose in number from 574,809 to 598,930 or by 4.2 per cent. The number of persons aged 65 years and over decreased slightly from 316,391 to 315,063 or by 0.4 per cent. In the previous intercensal period 1946 to 1951, the number of children under 15 years of age rose by 3.9 per cent while the number aged 15 to 44 decreased by 3.1 per cent. The number of persons aged 45 to 64 years increased by 1.8 per cent while the number aged 65 years and over increased by 0.7 per cent. The age distributions of the population in 1951 and 1961 are shown in Diagram 1.


Table 13 shows the distribution of the population in 1961 by age and conjugal condition. Despite the considerable fall in the total population between 1951 and 1961, the number of married persons increased in this period, from 912,858 to 921,831 or 1.0 per cent. Single persons aged 15 years or over decreased in number from $1,008,960$ in 1951 to 847,053 in 1961 or by 16.0 per cent, while widowed persons decreased in number from 183,965 to 172,198 or by 6.4 per cent. In the younger age groups the percentage of persons who were single in 1961 showed a considerable reduction compared with earlier censuses. Thus in the 30 to 34 years age group the proportion of males who were single declined from 61.0 per cent in 1946 to 57.9 per cent in 1951 and 49.2 per cent in 1961, while in the case of females in this age group the proportion who were single declined from 38.8 per cent in 1946 to 36.4 per cent in 1951 and 29.6 per cent in 1961.

There were 16,664 marriages registered in 1965, an increase of 536 on the previous year. The marriage rate, at 5.8 per 1,000 population is the highest since 1956. The marriage rates in Ireland, the Six Counties and England and Wales are compared for a number of years in Diagram 2. The low rate in Ireland as compared with the other two areas will be noted. The diagram shows that the outbreak of war in 1939 was followed by substantially increased marriage rates though there was considerable variation in the intensity and time of occurrence in the respective areas. While the wartime peak was reached in England and Wales in 1940 and the Six Counties in 1941, in Ireland no substantial change in the marriage rate was reached until 1942.

In 1957 particulars of ages of groom and bride became available from registration records for the first time, under the Marriages (Amendment of Form of Register and Certificates) Regulations, 1956. A cross-classification
of marriages registered in 1964 by age of groom and age of bride is contained in Table 26. Similar particulars were obtained from the 1946 Census of Population, relating to marriages which took place in the twelve months preceding that Census. A fairly substantial fall in the average ages at marriage occurred between 1945-46 and 1964. In 1964 the average age of grooms was 29.8 years compared with 33.1 years in the earlier period, while the average age of brides in 1964 was 26.3 years compared with 28.0 years in 1945-46.

There were 63,526 births registered in 1965,546 less than in 1964. The birth Rate was the same for each year, 22.3 per 1,000 population.

In Table 25 the total number of births registered in 1964 is shown classified by age of mother at maternity and number of previous children, while in Table 24 legitimate births are shown classified by age of mother at maternity and year of marriage.

The number of deaths registered in 1965 was 33,022 and the rate was 11.6 per 1,000 population. Marriage, birth and death rates since the year 1864 are shown in Diagram 3. Deaths in the years 1960 to 1965 classified by cause are shown in Table 17, while corresponding rates per 100,000 population are given in Table 18. Deaths from Tuberculosis (all forms) in 1965 numbered 334, compared with 401 in 1964. Further details of deaths from this disease are given in Tables 21 and 22, and it will be observed that a pronounced decline in the death rate from tuberculosis, has occurred in recent years. There were 4,979 deaths due to malignant neoplasms registered in 1965 equivalent to a rate of 1.74 per 1,000 population. Of these 2,238 or 45 per cent were due to malignant neoplasms of the digestive system. Deaths due to diseases of the circulatory system registered in 1965 numbered 12,646 , equivalent to a rate of 4.4 per 1,000 population. Of these coronary and arteriosclerotic heart disease accounted for 5,536 or 44 per cent while 3,122 or 25 per cent were due to "Other myocardial degeneration." Trends in the death rates from the various groups of diseases in the period since 1881 may be seen from Diagram 4.

There were 1,604 deaths of infants under one year of age registered in 1965 and of these 1,092 occurred at ages under 4 weeks. The infant mortality rate was 25 per 1,000 births registered and the neo-natal rate was 17 . The infant mortality since the year 1864 is shown in Diagram 5, and for comparison the birth rate is also shown.

Tables 27 and 28 show the expectation of life in 1960-62 for the State and for Urban Areas, separately. The expectation of life at birth was 68.13 years for males and 71.86 years for females. At the age of one year the corresponding figures were 69.33 years for males and 72.66 years for females. In Urban Areas males had expectations of life of 66.52 years at birth and 67.66 at age one year while the corresponding figures for females were 71.78 years and 72.67 years, respectively.

Between 1950-52 and 1960-62 there was an improvement in the expectation of life at all ages up to 82 years for males and up to 85 years for females in the State as a whole. Certain small decreases recorded at later ages were probably due to improvements in statements of age at the Census and at death.

Tables 29 to 32 are summary tables derived from the inquiry into the fertility of married women at the date of the 1961 Census. Particulars relating to 455,394 of the 468,228 married women in the State on 9th April, 1961, were used in compiling the fertility tables. The remainder (less than 3 per cent) were excluded because incomplete or obviously inaccurate information had been furnished.

There were $1,607,627$ children born alive in the 455,394 families. About 3.4 per cent of the children were in families of one child, 8.4 per cent were in families of 2 children, 39.9 per cent in families of 3 to 5 children, 35.8 per cent in families of 6 to 9 children and 12.5 per cent in families of 10 or more

children. The figures relating to marriages of 30 years duration or more show that in completed families 1.3 per cent of the children were in families of one child, 3.8 per cent were in families of 2 children, and the remaining 94.9 per cent were in families having 3 or more children. These figures indicate that among completed families the proportion of children from the 1 or 2 child family was very small.

Table 30 shows the average number of children born per 100 married women in 1946 and in 1961, classified by age of wife at marriage and duration of marriage. The rate for all durations and all ages of wife at marriage has remained steady at 3.53 per cent per married woman in 1946 and 1961. Standardised rates are also shown in the table. These represent what the 1946 fertility rates would have been if the distribution of age at marriage and of duration of marriage of the married women in 1946 had been the same as that of the married women in 1961. For all durations the standardised fertility rate fell by 4 per cent from 3.67 children in 1946 to 3.53 in 1961. The figures for different durations of marriage show that there was an increase in fertility for marriages of under 15 years duration, but there were decreases for all the other durations shown.

Tables 38 and 39 give particulars of the occupations of persons 14 years of age and over as returned at the Census of Population, 1961. All persons aged 14 years or over including those who were out of work are classified according to their usual occupation. If a person has more than one occupation the principal occupation, that is the one by which the living is mainly earned, is used for this classification. Occupations are divided into two broad categories, gainful and non-gainful, a gainful occupation being one from which (in general) an income is obtained. Certain occupations for which a fixed income is not received are, however, also classified as gainful, the principal group of persons in this category being those assisting relatives in farm work.

Gainfully occupied persons, excluding those who were out of work are, in addition classified by industry, and the 1961 results are shown in Tables 40 and 41. The distinction between the occupation and the industry classifications is of fundamental importance. The occupation is determined solely by the kind of work a person performs, e.g. electrician, lorry driver, clerk, typist, irrespective of the industry or business in which he or she is employed. The industry is determined by the type of undertaking in which a person is working, e.g. farm, grain mill, motor garage, hospital. Numerically the most important non-gainful occupations are " home duties," " student " and " retired."

A number of changes in principle were made in the occupational and industrial classifications at the 1961 Census in order to bring these more closely into line with international recommendations. As regards the occupational classification, the principal change compared with earlier censuses was that many classes of professional students who had formerly been classified as gainfully occupied were, in 1961, classified as not gainfully occupied. The 1961 occupational list, which conforms closely to the International Standard Classification of Occupation, differs considerably from the 1951 occupational list, and for detailed 1951-1961 comparisons, reference should be made to Volume III of the 1961 Census-Occupations. The principal change affecting the industries classification is that, whereas in 1951 and at earlier censuses persons having employment but temporarily in hospital were excluded, in 1961 such persons were included in the industry classifications, which thus relate to all persons having jobs. Motor garages, which in 1951 were included in the Manufacturing group of industries were, in 1961, included in Commerce; otherwise the 1951 and 1961 industry lists differ only very slightly.

While the total population aged 14 years or over decreased from 2,158,527 to $1,998,585$ or by 7.4 per cent, the number gainfully occupied decreased from $1,261,926$ to $1,108,108$ or by 12.2 per cent, and the number not gainfully occupied decreased from 896,601 to 890,477 or by 0.7 per cent. Thus in 1961 the gainfully occupied population represented 55.4 per cent of the total aged

14 years and over, compared with 58.5 per cent in 1951. The principal reduction between 1951 and 1961 occurred in the numbers in agricultural occupations, which fell from 509,334 to 392,675 or by 22.9 per cent. The greater part of this reduction was in the case of farmers' relatives assisting and farm labourers; the number of farmers in 1961 was 210,331 compared with 235,331 in 1951, a reduction of 10.6 per cent. Persons with agricultural occupations represented 35.4 per cent of the total number gainfully occupied in 1961, whereas in 1951 they represented 40.4 per cent of the total. Building and construction workers decreased in number from 69,820 to 49,524 or by 29.1 per cent, while Service workers decreased from 101,658 to 83,313 or 18.0 per cent, due mainly to the fall in numbers of domestic servants. Among the occupational groups in the case of which substantial increases occurred between 1951 and 1961 were Electrical and electronic workers (23.1 per cent increase), Machinists, fitters and related workers ( 13.2 per cent increase), Textile workers ( 15.4 per cent increase), Paper and printing workers ( 13.4 per cent increase), Warehousemen, storekeepers, packers and bottlers ( 23.6 per cent increase), Clerks and typists (10.9 per cent increase) and Professional and technical occupations (15.9 per cent increase). Among the non-gainfully occupied aged 14 years and over the principal increase occurred in the case of children attending secondary and vocational schools. The total number of children aged 14 years and over at school rose from 68,964 in 1951 to 100,394 in 1961 . Students in higher education, including professional students rose from 11,973 to 16,058 .

Table 44 shows for each Province the birthplaces of persons residing in this country in 1961. Persons born outside the State numbered 98,951 or 3.5 per cent of the total population. Of these almost two thirds were resident in Leinster. Persons born in the Six Counties numbered 27,129, those born in England and Wales 45,463 and those born in the United States of America 6,447.

Tables 45-48 refer to the number of Irish speakers in the State at certain Census dates. The figures in these tables must be accepted with reserve because the number of "Irish speakers" would appear to be far less susceptible of exact measurement than any of the other matters into which it is the purpose of the Census to inquire, on account of personal judgment entering into replies to questions designed to elicit information on this topic. The number of persons aged three years or over in respect of whom it was stated that they could speak Irish in 1961 was 716,420 or over one quarter of the total population at these ages. The corresponding number in 1946 was 588,725 or slightly over one fifth of the total population at these ages. Thus in the period 1946-61 there was an increase of 127,695 or 21.7 per cent in the number of Irish speakers. This increase followed a decline of 77,876 or 11.7 per cent in 1936-46.

While Table 45 relates to provinces and the whole country, Tables 46 and 47 relate to the Fior-Ghaeltacht and Breac-Ghaeltacht as defined in the Gaeltacht Commission Report, 1925. In the Fior-Ghaeltacht the percentage of persons who were Irish speakers declined from 76.3 in 1946 to 71.9 in 1961. In the Breac-Ghaeltacht the percentage of Irish speakers rose slightly from 33.8 to 35.3, while in the rest of the country the percentage of Irish speakers rose substantially from 16.7 per cent in 1946 to 24.1 per cent in 1961. Table 48 relates to the newly defined Gaeltacht for which 1961 figures only are available, and in this area 86.6 per cent of persons aged three years or over were Irish speakers.

## Section III. Agriculture Forestry and Fisheries.

## Sources

Irish agricultural statistics are derived principally from the census of farms taken annually on 1 June by members of the Gárda Síochána acting as official enumerators. Particulars are collected for each farm of the total area of land held; the area under crops and pasture; the number of livestock; the number of males engaged in farm work; the number of machines and implements; and certain other special enquiries which are varied from year to year. Statistics are available for each year from 1847 and have been summarized and analysed in detail up to 1956 in three official publications entitled "Agricultural Statistics 1847-1926"; "Agricultural Statistics 1927-1933" and " Agricultural Statistics 1934-56." Summaries of the figures for subsequent years up to and including 1965 have been published in the "Irish Statistical Bulletin" and in the "Statistical Abstract of Ireland." As a result of economy measures, the compilation of the June 1956 and 1957 Agricultural Statistics was confined to estimates based on sample returns covering 25 per cent

of the area of the county. The figures for 1958 and 1959 and for 1961 to 1964 (inclusive) are based on sample returns covering approximately 60 per cent of the country; those for 1960 and 1965 are based on a complete enumeration. The figures for 1957 are revised estimates based on sample returns covering approximately 25 per cent of the country and linked to the 1958 figures. Previous experience has shown that estimated totals for the whole area prepared in this way are quite reliable.

A partial census of livestock is also taken annually on 1 January from which the total number of cattle, sheep, pigs and poultry are estimated for a time of the year when stocks are at a minimum. The first winter census was taken in 1934 and counts have since been taken for 1938 to 1943 (inclusive), for 1945, and for each year since 1947. Estimates of crop yields are obtained from sample enquiries made annually in November.

## Land Utilisation

The total land area is 17.02 million acres of which, in 1965, 8.27 million were under pasture, 1.97 million under hay and 1.39 million under crops and fruit. The remainder, or " other land," 5.39 million acres, comprised woods and plantations, grazed and barren mountains, bogs, marshes, water, towns and roads. The distribution is illustrated in Diagram 1.

## Tillage

The two periods of compulsory tillage-the first during the 1914-18 war, the second after 1939-are the salient features of Diagram 2 showing the total area of tillage since 1901. During both these periods there were only minor increases in the areas under root and green crops, most of the temporarily increased acreage was sown with corn. As a result of the ploughing campaigns of 1917 and 1918, tillage rose by 648,000 acres from $1,735,000$ in 1916 to a peak of $2,383,000$ in 1918. After 1918 the slight downward trend in the acreage under the plough which prevailed before the war was resumed more steeply and by 1932 the area under crops had fallen by 40 per cent from the war-time peak to $1,424,000$ acres. The acreage of tillage subsequently recovered from this record low level, but further signs of decline were shown in 1937. Under the Compulsory Tillage Order (Emergency Powers Act, 1939) the total acreage ploughed rose by $1,075,000$ acres from $1,492,000$ in 1939 to a peak of $2,567,000$ in 1944-the highest recorded acreage under crops since 1872. Between 1944 and 1951 there was an almost equally sharp decline to $1,717,000$ acres followed by relatively small variations. The total area ploughed in 1965 was $1,395,000$ acres, which is 45.7 per cent below the 1944 peak, and 6.5 per cent less than in 1939.

## Corn Crops

Barley, oats and wheat, in that order, are now the principal corn crops but the reappearance in the present century of wheat as a main crop is of comparatively recent origin. From 1901 to 1932 the area under wheat was less than 40,000 acres except in the six years 1915-20. To meet temporary wartime requirements, the area of wheat was increased to a peak of 135,000 acres in 1918. In 1932 wheat covered only 21,000 acres, but, as a direct result of the Agricultural Produce (Cereals) Act, 1933 (which provided for a bounty on home grown millable wheat; imposed restrictions on the importation of wheat, maize and certain feeding stuffs; and made provision for the use of home-grown wheat in the manufacture of wheatmeal and flour and maize meal mixture for stock feeding) production was built up to 255,000 acres in 1939 and subsequently, during the second world war, to a peak of 662,000 acres in 1945. After 1945 the area under wheat fell sharply and by 1952 it was down to 254,000 acres. It rose in 1954 to 486,000 acres and then declined in 1956 to 340,000 acres. In 1958 the area sown increased to 419,000 acres; there was a very sharp decline again to 282,000 acres in 1959 and in 1960 an increase to 366,000 acres was recorded. Since 1960 there was a decline each year in the acreage sown to 182,000 acres in 1965. The land under oats declined from 723,000 acres in 1901 to 537,000 acres in 1939. There was, however, a temporary rise in production during the first world war to a peak of $1,129,000$ acres in 1918; thereafter the downward pre-war trend was resumed. During the second world war the area increased again to a peak of 945,000 acres in 1944 ( 16 per cent less than the 1918 peak) but since then it has fallen to 457,000 acres in 1958; 462,000 acres in 1959, 426,000 acres in 1960, 368,000 acres in 1961, 346,000 acres in 1962, 332,000 acres in 1963, 289,000 acres in 1964 and 284,000 acres in 1965. This reduction is due to a large extent to the decline over the period in the number of horses. In 1901 there were 158,000 acres under barley which until 1935 ranked as the second most important corn crop. Apart from minor fluctuations no noticeable decline in the acreage of barley appeared until after the peak crop of 202,000 acres in 1920. Throughout the twenties and early thirties, the acreage under barley was reduced to 103,000 acres in 1932 and subsequently, after a brief recovery, to the exceptionally low level of 74,000 acres in 1939. From 1939 to 1943 barley increased to 209,000 acres; thereafter the area began to fall again. In1951 and 1952 the acreage under barley increased substantially reaching a level of 225,000 acres in 1952. Subsequently the acreage

fell to 163,000 in 1954 but there has been an upward trend each year since then, with the exception of 1960 when there was a slight decrease, reaching a figure of 464,000 acres in 1965, the highest acreage yet recorded. This development in barley acreage is due mainly to the recent expansion in feeding barley which in 1965 accounted for 328,000 acres, almost three fourths of the total barley acreage.

## Root and Green Crops

The graph of potato production in the present century depicts an almost unbroken decline, apart from the 1914-18 period, from 458,000 acres in 1901 to 317,000 acres in 1939-a reduction of more than 30 per cent-followed by a steep rise to 428,000 acres in 1941. Since then there has been a steady decline to 174,000 acres in 1965. The acreage under turnips has not been so markedly affected by the two periods of compulsory tillage; from 1901 to 1920 the area was maintained without much change at an average of 217,000 acres, but since then there has been an almost uninterrupted decline to 120,000 acres in 1954. There was a slight increase to 129,000 acres in 1955, but a further decline to 99,000 acres in 1964. The acreage rose again to 107,000 in 1965. One of the most important changes in root and green crops since the beginning of the century was the introduction in 1926 of sugar beet as a main crop. Until 1933 the production of this crop was concentrated mainly in Counties Carlow, Kildare Laoighis and Wexford, which together, in 1933, accounted for 80 per cent of the total crop of 15,000 acres. The acreage under sugar beet reached a peak of 85,000 in 1945, but fell to 54,000 in 1952. In 1954 the acreage rose again to 74,000 but fell to 55,000 acres in 1955. There was a sharp increase to 71,000 acres in 1957 and with a still further increase to 85,000 acres in 1958 the acreage reached the peak 1945 level. There was a sharp decline to 69,000 acres in 1959; in 1960 there was a further decline to 68,000 acres; an increase to 79,000 acres was recorded in 1961 and a slight fall to 78,000 acres in 1962. In 1963 the acreage rose to a record figure of 88,000 but a drop to 80,000 acres was recorded in 1964. In 1965 there was a still further drop to 66,000 acres. Cork ( 17,200 acres), Wexford ( 11,900 acres), Laoighis ( 5,800 acres), Tipperary ( 4,800 acres), Kilkenny ( 4,800 acres), Carlow ( 4,800 acres), Galway ( 3,800 acres), Kildare ( 3,200 acres), Waterford

(2,900 acres) and Offaly (2,300 acres) are the leading producing counties; together they account for 94 per cent of the sugar beet crop in 1965.

## Hay and Pasture

The area under hay crops has increased slightly since the beginning of the century, but, as will be seen from Diagram 5, the area has been more or less stabilized at about $2,000,000$ acres since 1911. Pasture, by contrast, declined by 8.2 per cent, from $9,011,000$ acres in 1901 to $8,270,000$ acres in 1965, but it will be seen that the lowest levels were reached during the two periods of compulsory tillage, and that by 1965 there had been an increase of $1,178,000$ acres, that is 17 per cent above the record low figure of $7,092,000$ acres in 1944. The figures for pasture, crops and pasture and for other land for the years 1960 to 1964 inclusive are not directly comparable with those for previous years. (See Notes accompanying Agricultural Statistics, 1960Supplement issued with the June, 1961 Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin). However, all the 1965 figures are comparable with those published for years prior to 1960 (See Notes accompanying Agricultural Statistics, 1965 in the March, 1966 issue of the Irish Statistical Bulletin). Statistics of the area under pasture are not available for the six years 1919-24, but it is evident that during this period there was a widespread return to pastureland of fields compulsorily brought under the plough in 1917 and 1918.

## Livestock

The changes since 1901 in the numbers of cattle are shown in Diagram 6 and those in sheep, pigs and horses are shown in Diagram 7. Throughout the last fifty years there has been on balance an increase in the number of cattle. Between 1901 and 1921 the numbers increased from $3,868,000$ to $4,419,000$, that is, by 14 per cent. There followed a sharp decline to $3,947,000$ in 1926 from which level there was a faltering but continued improvement to $4,246,000$ in 1944, after which cattle stocks were again reduced to $3,921,000$ in 1948. Since then the number increased fairly steadily until 1956 when the population was $4,537,000$. Cattle stocks, however, were again reduced to $4,417,000$ in 1957 but showed an increase to $4,741,000$ in 1960. There was a decline again to $4,713,000$ in 1961 but since then the number increased steadily, reaching a record number of $5,359,000$ in 1965. A more detailed analysis of the changes in cattle numbers is given in the article "Trends in Cattle Population and Output" published in the September, 1955 issue of the " Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin."

In Diagram 6 the number of milch cows and cattle under 1 year old are shown separately. "Other cattle" in Diagram 6 includes all cattle except milch cows and cattle under 1 year; the expression is therefore different in scope from the term " other cattle " used in Table 55.

From 1901 to 1923 the number of sheep fell from 3,981,000 to $2,666,000$. Between 1923 and 1931 there was a temporary increase and the number rose by more than one-third to $3,575,000$ in a period of eight years. After 1931 the decline was resumed and by 1948 there were only $2,058,000$ or little more than half the number at the turn of the century. Since 1948, however, there has been an increase each year until 1959 when the figure was $4,412,000$. There was a decline again to $4,314,000$ in 1960 but in 1961 the figure rose to $4,528,000$. This upward trend has since been maintained and in 1965 the figure reached $5,014,000$, the highest sheep population ever recorded. The number of pigs fluctuates considerably from year to year, but from 1901 to 1940 there was little change in the long-term average of one million pigs. During the second world war however, the shortage of imported feeding stuffs resulted in a drastic reduction in the total number of pigs and in 1944 there were only 381,000 . The recovery in the following years was comparatively slow but the 1954 population of 958,000 had almost reached the pre-war level. Pig numbers, however, declined sharply in 1955 and by 1956 they were down to 747,000 . A sharp increase to 900,000 was recorded in 1957 with a further increase to 948,000 in 1958. In 1959 numbers again fell to 852,000 but in 1960 the upward trend was resumed and in 1962 a figure of $1,111,000$ was reached. A slight decrease in numbers to $1,102,000$ was recorded in 1963 but in 1964 the numbers increased to $1,108,000$, with a further increase to $1,266,000$ in 1965. The number of horses and ponies in 1945 totalled 465,000 compared with 435,000 in 1901, but the number has since fallen each year to 172,000 in 1965.

The statistics of total poultry given in Table 55 cannot be compared over the whole of the present century for in 1907 the classification was changed to include young poultry and in the years 1948 to 1953 guinea fowl were included in the census. At the end of the 1914-18 war the number of poultry totalled about 17 million and remained at that level until 1925. From 1926 to 1933 poultry stocks increased to between 22 and 23 million, but throughout the latter half of the 'thirties their numbers were rather less than 20 million. During the second world war a further reduction took place, but the numbers did not fall below 17 million. Stocks increased from 17 million in 1947 to 21 million (excluding guinea fowl) in 1950, but since then there was an almost uninterrupted decline to 11 million in 1965.

## Output

Estimates of the quantity and value of agricultural output for 1926-27 were given in "The Agricultural Output of Saorstat Eireann 1926-27" (P.No.132). Estimates were also made for 1929-30, but there was a further gap in this series of statistics until the figures for 1934-35 were published. Since then estimates have been made annually. All the estimates of agricultural output from 1926-27 up to 1956 have been included in a Report entitled " Agricultural Statistics 1934-56 " (Pr. 4335).

A brief history of the agricultural output series together with a summary of the principles and methods of estimation used was published in the June, 1952 issue of the "Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin." In preparing the 1958 and 1961 output estimates reviews were made of the methods used and of the data available for the estimation of the individual items. Following on these reviews changes were found necessary in a number of items. These changes which were described in the June 1959 and the September 1962 issues of the Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin were carried out for 1947 and subsequent years. It has not been feasible to carry out changes for earlier years and consequently two series are included in Tables 66 and 67. The data already published in respect of the years prior to 1953 for individual products are not directly comparable with those given in Table 68. On the occasion of the 1958 revision a new series of volume index numbers of gross and net agricultural output to base $1953=100$ was calculated. Two series of volume index numbers are now given: the old series (to base 1938-39=100)
from 1938-39 to 1947 and the new series (to base $1953=100$ ) for the years 1938-39 and from 1947 to 1965.

It should be noted that many of the elements in the compilation of the agricultural output figures are estimates subject to margins of error and therefore it is to be expected that amendments to the figures may be made from time to time as better information becomes available. Generally more reliance can be placed on the changes between consecutive years than on the absolute level of the figures for any year.

Gross Agricultural Output is defined as that portion of total agricultural production which is sold off farms or which is consumed by persons on farms during the year of enquiry. It may include the value of changes in livestock numbers during the year. It does not however include any part of the produce used for further agricultural production on the farm on which it was produced or which was sold by one farmer to another: for example milk fed to calves, potatoes fed to pigs, turnips and mangels fed to cattle and livestock sold by one farmer to another. All sales off farms of wheat, barley and grass seed are treated as agricultural output while all seeds and feeding stuffs of these crops repurchased by farmers from merchants, seedsmen or feed compounders are included at retail prices as inputs. In the case of other crops however, particularly potatoes and oats, large proportions of which are sold by one farmer to another, a different method of treatment is adapted. Sales of oats by farmers to merchants, dealers, etc., which are later repurchased by farmers for seed or as whole oats for feed, are excluded from both output and inputs. On the other hand, oats sold off farms and later repurchased in a processed form for feed (i.e. as crushed oats, ground oats or in compound feeds) is included in output and inputs. In the case of potatoes and other crops, only the net amounts permanently sold off farms or consumed by persons on farms are treated as output. In the valuation of output the underlying principle is that commodities are valued at prices which it is estimated farmers actually received for them.

For a number of important items such as wheat, sugar beet, barley, milk sold to creameries, pigs and cattle sold to factories, etc., the total quantities purchased and the amounts paid by the purchasers are available. For these items, adjustments are made to the total amounts paid, to allow for marketing margins and where possible, transport costs, and the adjusted figures entered as the output value. A further adjustment is made in the case of cattle to take account of certain payments to farmers arising out of the operations under the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme. In the case of live exports, the f.o.b. export value, less an allowance for marketing margins, is taken as the output value. For the remaining items, fair or market prices are used as the basis of valuation; (in determining the various expenses which are deducted from gross agricultural output to arrive at income from agriculture, allowance is made for any transport costs which it was not possible to eliminate from price levels at the output valuation stage). Produce consumed by persons on farms is assumed to be identical in quality with produce sold and except in the case of milk is valued accordingly. In valuing milk consumed on farms, an allowance has been made for the cost which would be incurred of marketing this milk if it were sold. Changes in livestock numbers are valued at end of the year agricultural prices. No account is taken of changes in stock other than livestock. Imports of livestock, principally cattle, are deducted.

Gross agricultural output in 1965 (excluding value of livestock changes) amounted to $£ 232.1$ million. The corresponding figure for 1964 was $£ 230.3$ million. The increase in value of sales plus household consumption between the two years was therefore $£ 1.8$ million. To provide an appropriate overall measure of gross output attributable to agricultural activity in any particular year however it is necessary to take into account not only output disposed of, but also the extent to which livestock numbers on farms have changed during that year. In 1964 the value of changes in livestock numbers was assessed as an increase of $£ 9.7$ million due to increases of $155,000,69,000$ and 145,000 in cattle, sheep and pigs respectively. The gross output aggregate appropriate to agricultural activity in that year was therefore $£ 240.0$ million (i.e. $\AA_{2} 230.3$ million disposals plus $£ 9.7$ million changes in stocks). In 1965 cattle and sheep numbers on farms increased by 422,000 and 8,000 respectively, but there was a decline of

56,000 in pig numbers. The value of these changes has been assessed as an increase of $£ 20.1$ million. Thus when changes in stocks are allowed for, gross output in 1965 is estimated to have been $£ 12.2$ million or 5.1 per cent greater than the corresponding total in 1964.

## Employment

Returns of the number of persons actively engaged in agriculture were first collected in the annual farm census of June, 1912. They were collected again in 1927 and annually since then, but for male workers only as from 1931. The total number of males engaged on farm work declined from 597,000 in 1927 to 421,000 in 1953-an average decrease of 6,800 a year; between 1942 and 1953 the rate of decline was 11,000 a year. In 1954 there was a slight increase, the first recorded since 1941. Since then the downward trends have continued unbroken-between 1954 and 1964 the numbers declined by 77,000 , a rate of 7,700 per year. Between 1962 and 1963 the total number of males engaged in farm work fell by 6,000 ; between 1963 and 1964 the decline increased to 11,000 and between 1964 and 1965 there was a further decrease of 13,000 .

## Wages

Minimum weekly rates of wages of male agricultural workers, as fixed by the Agricultural Wages (Minimum Rates) Orders, are given in Table 63 and average minimum weekly rates (in July) for a number of years, in Table 64.

## Fisheries

The quantity of fish landed in 1965 was $563,000 \mathrm{cwt}$ and its value, $£ 1,269,000$. The figures for 1964 were 488,000 and $£ 1,085,000$. The number of boats used only for fishing decreased from 1,050 in 1964 to 942 in 1965. The number of men regularly engaged in sea fishing was 1,593 in 1965 , whilst the number of those occasionally engaged in the industry was 3,760 in 1965 . Of the total tonnage of fish landed, herring accounted for 37 per cent and whiting for 19 per cent. Among catches of inland fish salmon decreased by $143,413 \mathrm{lbs}$. on the 1964 figure. Expenditure by the Boards of Fishery's Conservators in 1965 amounted to $£ 123,000$.

## Land Purchase and Settlement

The main object of the principal Land Acts of this century has been the completion of tenanted land purchase. Through the operation of the earlier Acts, some 300,000 tenants were assisted in purchasing 11 million acres at a price of $£ 100$ million. Despite the vast amount of work done under these Acts, however, over 25 per cent of tenancies remained under landlords by 1923 and, as is only to be expected in such a residue, these tenancies comprised the most acutely uneconomic holdings in the State, situated mainly in Western areas where rundale conditions predominate.

Since the passing of the 1923 Act-which was designed to expedite these outstanding cases-upwards of 113,000 tenancies comprising over $3,123,000$ acres have been purchased from landlords for about $£ 21$ million. Of the 3 million odd acres which vested in the Land Commission, over 23 million had, by 31 March, 1965, been transferred in fee simple to some 102,400 occupying tenants at a resale price of $£ 17,576,000$-after improvement, enlargement or rearrangement in appropriate cases. In the year ended 31 March, 1965, a total of 8,006 acres was so transferred in fee simple to 332 occupying tenants at a resale price of $£ 12,924$. This work has now been virtually completed in the following twenty counties, viz. Carlow, Cavan, Clare, Dublin, Kildare, Kilkenny, Laois, Leitrim, Limerick, Longford, Louth, Meath, Monaghan, Offaly, Sligo, Tipperary, Waterford, Westmeath, Wexford and Wicklow.

At 31 March, 1965, some 5,700 tenanted holdings on estates purchased under the Land Acts, 1923-65, were pending for revesting in tenants, and these, together with about 1,600 holdings on estates of the former Congested Districts Board, now constitute the residual hard core of tenanted land for resale. These holdings, aggregating about 7,300 , are situated, for the most part, in Western Congested Counties and the majority of them require rearrangement, enlargement or other improvement before they can be released for final vesting.

Relief of the acute congestion which prevails in the western counties and enlargement of uneconomic holdings throughout the State now represent the
main task of the Land Commission. To this end, policy in recent years has aimed at a steady land-division programme of 25,000 acres per annum. In the year ended 31 March, 1965, some 43,400 acres were acquired, resumed or otherwise taken over for allotment. The area of untenanted land, purchased or acquired under the Land Acts, 1923-65, which has been divided from 1923 to 31 March, 1965 , amongst some 86,000 allottees was $1,383,000$ acres, of which 608,000 acres were utilised to enlarge 50,700 uneconomic holdings and 775,000 acres to provide 35,300 new holdings or plots.

During the year ended 31 March, 1965, under the Land Acts, 1923-65, an area of 31,697 acres was distributed in 1,677 allotments. Of this area, 9,670 acres were utilised for the enlargement of 825 uneconomic holdings and the balance was allotted in 554 parcels (comprising 16,871 acres) and 298 accommodation, turbary or forestry plots (comprising 5,156 acres). Of the 554 parcels, 533 containing 16,428 acres, were allotted either to migrants, for whom 114 fully-equipped new holdings were provided (the lands vacated by these allottees becoming available for relief of local congestion) or in connection with partial exchanges or rearrangements. In addition to the lands allotted under the Land Acts, 1923-65, an area of 4,256 acres on estates of the former Congested Districts Board and Estates Commissioners was distributed in 205 allotments bringing the total area of land allotted during the year to 35,953 acres and the number of allotments to 1,882 .

Rearrangement schemes, i.e. the regrouping into compact workable units of a series of scattered plots, is nowadays a very important feature of land settlement activity by the Land Commission. During the year ended 31st March, 1965, a total of 480 holdings, involving an area of 11,198 acres was rearranged, the vast bulk of these holdings being enlarged in the process of rearrangement. Since 1950, the total number of holdings rearranged was 7,180 involving an aggregate area of 189,343 acres, while the number of migrants resettled on new holdings was 1,157 .

The total annual expenditure on improvement works now exceeds $£ 750,000$, the bulk of which is incurred in connection with land-division schemes-on the erection of dwelling-houses and out-offices, the provision and repair of access roads, fencing, drainage, etc. The total expenditure to 31 March, 1965, exceeds $£ 21$ million, of which some $£ 18$ million was incurred since 1923 . About 60 per cent of this money has been spent in western congested counties.

The ultimate stage of land purchase is popularly known as final vesting or revesting, i.e. the transfer to the occupier of the full freehold title to his lands subject to the condition that he pays the annuity due out of his lands until his advance is repaid. During the year ended 31st March, 1965, the freehold title to some 3,400 holdings and allotments comprising 44,000 acres, was thus transferred to the occupiers.

The total resale price of all the lands dealt with amounts to more than $£ 137$ million, almost all of which was advanced to the purchasers on long-term repayment. As a result the Land Commission are responsible for the collection of about $£ 2 \frac{1}{2}$ million per annum by way of land annuities in repayment of the advances made and still outstanding. This figure of $£ 2 \frac{1}{2}$ million represents the reduced payments following the halving of annuities under the Land Act, 1933. Of the total amount of some $£ 78.6$ million collectible since 1933 , over 99.8 per cent had been collected by 31 March, 1965.

Of the above total advances made under the Land Acts, 1903-19, $£ 3,880,863$ (together with $£ 78,956$ additional cash lodged as portion of the price) was advanced since the transfer of the Land Commission to the Irish Government on the 31st March, 1923, in respect of an area of 494,690 acres comprising 15,979 holdings, in addition to the advances made under the Land Acts, 1923-54.
3. The figures in the above table include Estates purchased for resale by the late Congested Districts Board and the Estates Commissioners under Acts prior to the Land Act, 1923, and Untenanted land purchased for division and resale by the Land Commission under the Land Acts, 1923-65. The lands so purchased have not yet been all resold, but the tenants and allottees of the portions not yet resold are, as far as possible, put on a purchase annuity basis under the Land Act, 1931 (Secs. 23 and 24) and the Land Act, 1936 (Sec. 33), pending final resale.

## Section IV.-Industrial Production.

## Sources

Statistics of Irish industrial production are mainly derived from annual Censuses of Industrial Production taken under the Statistics Acts, 1926 and 1946. Inter-census statistics are obtained from voluntary quarterly inquiries.

The first Census of Industrial Production was taken in respect of the year 1926, the second for 1929, and the third for 1931. Censuses have been taken annually from the latter year, but those for the four years 1932 to 1935 were restricted to twenty-three manufacturing industries and those for the four years 1939 to 1942 extended to " transportable goods industries" only. The full censuses cover " transportable goods," services (e.g., public utilities electricity and gas undertakings, etc.) and building and construction.

The results of the censuses in respect of the years 1948 to 1964 have been published in the quarterly issues of the " Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin" from December, 1949 to December, 1963 and in the issues of the Irish Statistical Bulletin from March, 1964 to December, 1966.

## Definitions

Gross Output is the net selling value at factory of all goods manufactured or produced during the year whether sold or added to stock. Bounties and subsidies payable to firms on products manufactured during the year are included in the net selling value while home levies on final products are deducted. Amounts received for repair work and work done on commission for other firms or customers on material supplied by them are included. Repairs to a firm's own buildings and plant executed by the firm's own workpeople are not regarded as output.

Cost of Materials includes purchased materials actually used for production and repair work during the year whether purchased during the year or taken from stock. Levies paid by firms on materials used by them are included in the cost.

Net Output is the difference between the value of the gross output and the cost of materials (including fuel and packing materials) used together with the amount paid to other firms for work done; it represents the value added by industry to the cost of materials used, or the increment created by industrial processes. Net output is the fund from which dividends, additions to reserve, wages, salaries, depreciation, rent, royalties, rates, taxes, advertising costs and all similar expenses are paid. It is consequently the best measure of the relative economic importance of the various industries.

## Industrial Production 1936-1964.

The growth of industrial production in the period 1936 to 1964 is illustrated in the following diagrams. It will be seen that, in the period covered, em-

ployment in all industries covered by the Census of Industrial Production has increased by 63.6 per cent; the average number of persons engaged has risen from 154,000 in 1936 to 252,000 in 1964. In the same period the gross output of all industries has risen from $£ 81.4$ million to $£ 751.0$ million and aggregate
net output has increased from $£ 33.9$ million to $£ 273.9$ million. In 1938 the average number of persons employed was 167,000 ; gross output

totalled $£ 90.0$ million and net output $£ 36.0$ million, of which $£ 21.4$ million, or 60 per cent, was paid in wages and salaries. Total wages and salaries in 1964 amounted to $f 153.1$ million, or 56 per cent of aggregate net output, compared with $£ 18.7$ million ( 55 per cent) in 1936.

Changes in the value of output reflect both changes in the value of money and in the volume of goods produced, and the effects of price movements between 1936 and 1964 on the value of gross and net output mask the variations in the quantitative output of industry during the period. The index numbers of the volume of production, therefore, afford a better guide to the expansion of physical output during this period. The volume of production index for all industries (base: year 1953 $=100$ ) was 52 in 1936 and 55 in 1938: during the emergency it fell to 40 in 1943 and only regained its pre-war level in 1946 when it rose to 56 . Between 1946 and 1947 it increased by 10 per cent and during the next three years it increased at a rate of 14 per cent per annum to 92 in 1950. In 1951 it rose to 93 and remained at almost the same level in 1952. In 1954 it rose to 105 and in 1955 to 108 but in 1956 it fell to 104 and in 1957 to 99 . The volume of production rose again to 102 in 1958 and has continued to rise each year since then at an average rate of 9 per cent per annum reaching a peak of 157 in 1964.

## Transportable Goods

The growth of industry since 1936 is demonstrated more clearly in the diagrams on previous page which refer to industries manufacturing transportable goods. The restricted censuses of 1939 to 1942 included transportable goods industries and the quarterly volume of production indices (Table 112), which cover only these industries, afford preliminary indications of the trend of production between 1964 and the second quarter of 1966 . The volume of production index for transportable goods industries fell from 56 in 1939 to a nadir of 43 in 1942. From then it began to recover slowly, but until 1946 it remained below the 1938 level of 54. By 1946 the volume of transportable goods produced had risen to 61 and in the next five years it increased by 55 per cent to 94 in 1951. The volume of production in 1952 fell to 92 or 2.6 per cent below the level of 1951. In 1953 it rose sharply again and in 1955 was 108, but fell to 105 in 1956. It remained at the same level in 1957 but it has risen steadily each year since then to a level of 165 in 1964. The volume of production of transportable goods in 1965 was 171 (average of the four quarters).

Important industries which showed the greatest percentage increases in volume of production in 1964 as compared with 1963 were:-structural clay products, etc., 25.0 per cent; metal trades, 18.5 per cent; quarrying stone, slate, sand and gravel, 18.0 per cent; cement, 17.4 per cent; linen and cotton, etc., 15.6 per cent; assembly etc. of mechanically propelled road and land vehicles, 15.2 per cent.

## Capital Goods and Consumer Goods

It is estimated that the total net output of manufacturing industries in 1964 ( $£ 196$ million), was attributable as follows:-(i) 18 per cent to industries manufacturing mainly or wholly producers' equipment and materials for capital goods; (ii) 11 per cent to those producing consumers' capital goods and (iii) 71 per cent to industries producing goods currently consumed or materials therefor. This analysis is based on the principles recommended in the League of Nations "Studies and Reports on Statistical Methods No. 6" (Official No. C 333, M. 85). Compared with the base year 1953 the volume of production of (i), (ii) and (iii) is estimated to have increased by 121, 124 and 38 per cent, respectively.

## Earnings and Hours Worked

Tables 116-117 show the average earnings per hour and per week of and the average hours worked per week by wage-earners. For all industries and services between October, 1963 and 1964 the average weekly earnings of adult males increased from 231s. 2 d . to 255 s . 7 d . and from 125 s .1 d . to 136 s .8 d . for adult females. For transportable goods only, between 1963 and 1964 the average weekly earnings of adult males increased from 240 s .6 d . to 266 s . 2 d ., and those of
adult females from 126s. 1d. to 137s. 6d. An indication of the increases which took place from Oct., 1964 to June, 1966 is afforded in the case of the transportable goods industries by the series of quarterly inquiries (Table 120). The average earnings of all industrial workers, (including men, women, boys and girls) was 232s. 7d. in June, 1966, compared with 207s. 5d. in October, 1964, (the date to which the full Census of Industrial Production data on earnings relate): this represents an increase of over 12 per cent. In October, 1964 the average number of hours worked per week in all industries and services was 45.2 for men and 41.4 for women. The corresponding figures in 1938 were 44.5 hours for men and 43.5 hours for women.

## Section V. External Trade.

In January, 1963 new and substantially revised Import and Export Lists were introduced for the classification of goods entering and leaving the State. These lists are based on the Standard International Trade Classification of the United Nations (S.I.T.C. Revised) and allow direct comparisons to be made between the trade statistics of this country and those of the many other countries now using this system.

Shannon Free Airport is regarded as a separate Customs Area. Consequently, trade with that area is treated as external trade while trade between the Free Airport and other countries is entirely excluded from Irish trade statistics.

The system of compilation used, is that generally adopted for recording international trade, that is to say, no distinction is made at the time of entry between goods intended for domestic consumption and goods not so intended and no distinction is made at the time of leaving between goods despatched from a Customs bonded warehouse and goods otherwise despatched. Goods which at the time of leaving are in substantially the same state as when they entered are distinguished as re-exports. Re-exports of live animals, however, are included in the figures for domestic exports because of the difficulty of separate classification.

The aggregate value of imports in 1965, at $£ 371.7$ million was $£ 22.4$ million (or 6.4 per cent) above the figure for 1964 . Total exports, at $£ 220.8$ million, were $f 1.2$ million below the 1964 figure while the import excess rose by $£ 23.7$ million to $£ 151.0$ million.

Table 121 shows the value of imports and exports since 1928. A series of sample enquiries into imports and exports, begun in 1955, led to revisions in the estimated value of external trade consigned by parcel post in that year. It was not possible to carry these amendments back beyond 1955 and consequently, for comparative purposes, both the old and new figures for 1955 have been shown. See footnote (b) to Table 121.

## Volume of Trade

Table 121 shows the volume of imports and exports since 1928. These index numbers represent the estimated value of trade each year at constant prices, thus eliminating the effects of changes of prices from year to year, and indicate the total quantities of goods imported and exported.

The volume of imports reached a record level in 1965 being 3.9 per cent greater than in 1964. Exports showed a reduction of 1.6 per cent on the record level attained in 1964, but were higher than for any earlier year.

Price (unit value) index numbers for imports and exports are dealt with in Section XII of the Abstract.

## Origin of Imports and Destination of Exports

Tables 122 and 123 show, respectively, the value of imports from the principal countries of origin and the value of exports to the principal countries of final destination in each of the years 1961 to 1965. Almost two thirds of the total value of imports in 1965 originated in four countries-Britain, Western Germany, the United States of America and the Six Counties. Imports from Britain, which constituted 46.6 per cent of total imports in that year, were valued at $£ 173.4$ million. Imports from Western Germany amounted to $£ 23.9$ million or 6.4 per cent of the total; imports from the United States of America totalled $£ 29.8$ million or 8.0 per cent, and imports from the Six Counties amounted to $£ 14.7$ million or 3.9 per cent. The other countries in which large imports originated were Netherlands- $£ 10.1$ million, France- $£ 10.7$ million, Canada- $£ 9.7$ million and Belgium- $£ 7.2$ million. Exports in 1965 went primarily, as usual, to Britain and the Six Counties which together accounted for $£ 154.0$ million or 69.6 per cent of the total. The remainder went to a large number of countries, the principal being the United States of America to which exports were valued at $\npreceq 8.8$ million and Western Germany, which took $£ 11.8$ million.

## Trade by Sections and Divisions

Tables 124,125 and 126 show the value, by sections and divisions, of imports, domestic exports and re-exports respectively for 1964 and 1965. Imports of live animals, food and food preparations at $£ 64.8$ million in 1965 were $£ 8.9$ million higher than in 1964, cereals and cereal preparations contributing $£ 8.3$ million; feeding stuffs for animals (except unmilled cereals) $£^{2.1}$ million, coffee, tea, etc., $£ 0.9$ million and miscellaneous food preparations $£ 0.6$ million. Imports of live animals, however, fell by $£ 1.9$ million and sugar and preparations by $£ 1.6$ millions. Raw materials other than fuels fell by $£ 1.5$ million with a decrease of $£ 2.0$ million in textile fibres and their waste while imports of wood, lumber and cork increased by $£ 0.7$ million. Petroleum accounted for all the increase of $£ 1.8$ million in fuels. Medical and pharmaceutical products contributed $£ 1.9$ million, plastic materials $£ 0.9$ million and organic and inorganic chemicals $£ 0.9$ million to the rise of $£ 4.1$ million in imports of chemicals. Imports of machinery and transport equipment rose by $£ 7.7$ million towards which machinery (non-electric) contributed $£ 2.7$ million and transport equipment contributed $£ 4.4$ million. Manufactured articles n.e.s. showed a rise of $£ 1.5$ million.

Exports of live animals, food and food preparations decreased from $\notin 129.7$ million in 1964 to $£ 121.8$ million in 1965 . The number of cattle permanently exported fell by 197,000 to 596,768 and were valued at $f 44.7$ million, a decrease of $£ 10.1$ million on the 1964 figure. Exports of fresh or chilled beef rose from $£ 10.6$ million to $£ 12.2$ million but frozen beef on the other hand fell from $£ 3.8$ million to $£ 3.1$ million. Pork exports rose by $£ 2.2$ million but bacon showed a fall of $£ 0.5$ million to $£ 6.6$ million. Cream, creamery butter and cheese contributed to a rise of $£ 0.6$ million in dairy products and eggs. Textile fibres and waste accounted for $£ 1.1$ million of the $£ 2.0$ million increase in crude materials inedible while petroleum products accounted for the rise of $£ 0.7$ million in fuels. Exports of chemicals rose from $£ 1.9$ million to $£ 4.8$ million, medicinal and pharmaceutical products contributing $£ 2.6$ million to the rise of $£ 2.9$ million. Transport equipment accounted for the $£ 2.1$ million fall in machinery and transport equipment.

## Estimated Distribution of Imports by Main Uses

Table 127 presents an analysis of the estimated distribution of imports by main uses in the years 1961 to 1965 . Over this period the principal relative change shown was the increase in the proportion of imports in the category producers' capital goods ready for use which rose from 13.3 per cent of the total in 1961 to 16.2 per cent in 1965. This was counterbalanced by a decline from 61.2 per cent to 59.1 per cent in the proportion attributable to materials for further production while consumption goods ready for use constituted almost the same proportion of the total at the beginning and end of the period.

Wheat imports amounted to 133,000 tons ( $£ 3.6$ million) in $1962,227,000$ tons ( $£ 6.0$ million) in 1963, 167,000 tons ( $£ 4.4$ million) in 1964 and 323,000 tons ( $£ 8.1$ million) in 1965 . The bulk of the imports over the period came from Australia and Canada but relatively substantial quantities were also imported from France, the U.S.A., the Netherlands and Argentina in 1965. The variations in wheat imports were, of course, connected with the quantity and quality of the home grown grain and it may be noted that there were also wheat exports of 32,000 tons in 1962, 56,000 tons in 1963 and 148 tons in 1964. There were no exports of wheat in 1965.

## Imports of Certain Commodities

The data on imports of wheat and certain other unmilled cereals in each year 1962-65 is shown in Table A.

The imports of maize amounted to 182,000 tons ( $£ 3.6$ million) in 1962 , to 83,000 tons ( $£ 1.8$ million) in 1963, to 107,000 tons ( $£ 2.4$ million) in 1964 and to 117,000 tons ( $£ 2.8$ million) in 1965. Again the level of these imports depends to a large extent on the home grown grain available for animal feeding. The U.S.A. was the main source of maize imports throughout the period.

Relatively small quantities of barley are imported but in 1965 imports of barley amounted to 79,000 tons ( $£ 2.0$ million), the bulk of these imports coming from France.

The very substantial growth in recent years in imports of machinery and of electrical goods may be seen in Table B, which shows the values of certain general categories of such imports for each year 1962-65. The total value of non-electrical machinery imports rose from $£ 31.0$ million in 1962 to $£ 42.8$ million in 1965, while the value of the imports of electrical machinery and goods increased from $£ 12.8$ million in 1962 to $£ 18.9$ million in 1965.

Many of the headings shown in respect of non-electrical machinery shared in the rise in imports over the period 1962-1965 although in a number of instances the levels reached in 1964 were not maintained in 1965. This is particularly true of apparatus for heating and cooling, liquid and air pumps and paper and printing machinery. The most notable increases over the four year period occurred in excavating and mining machinery, in agricultural machinery and in office machinery while the only declines were in respect of boilers and boilerhouse plant, steam engines and parts and in metal working machinery.

Imports of electrical machinery, goods and apparatus have increased by almost 50 per cent in the period 1962-1965. The largest increase, from $t^{2.5}$ million to $\AA 5.1$ million was in respect of electrical machinery but this was lower than the level of $£ 5.4$ million reached in 1964 . Very substantial rises were also recorded under each of the other headings in this group, except radio apparatus, etc. which has been declining since 1962.

Table C shows the value of the imports of vehicles in each year 1962-1965. Over this period there was a rise of 50 per cent in the aggregate value of imports in this group from $£ 20.8$ million to $£ 31.5$ million. The principal item which contributed to this increase was the steady rise in the imports of chassis and body aggregates for road motor vehicles. This amounted to $£ 13.7$ million in 1962 , to $£ 15.6$ million in 1963 , to $£ 17.6$ million in 1964 and to $£ 18.6$ million in 1965. There were in 1962 fairly substantial imports of railway vehicles and parts. Such imports accounted for $£ 2.7$ million in 1964 but fell to $£ 0.5$ million in 1963 , to $£ 0.4$ million in 1964 and rose to $£ 0.6$ million in 1965. The purchase of a large ship by Irish Shipping Ltd. is reflected in the substantial increase in imports of ships and boats in 1963, while the substantial investment by Aer Lingus in new aircraft in 1964 and again in 1965 is evident from the figures for aircraft and parts.

Table D gives particulars of the value of imports of textiles (other than apparel) in each year 1962-1965. Total imports over the period rose from $£ 26.5$ million in 1962 to $£ 28.4$ million in 1963 , to $£ 34.1$ million in 1964 but fell to $\AA 29.2$ million in 1965. Imports of wool fibres were valued at $£ 3.9$ million in 1962 , rose to $£ 4.5$ million in 1963 , to $£ 5.2$ million in 1964 but fell to $£ 4.1$ million in 1965 which is only slightly higher than the 1962 figure. Other fibres tended to follow the same trend during the period. Total imports of fibres rose from $f_{8} .4$ million in 1962 and 1963 to $£ 10.1$ million in 1964 but declined to $£ 8.1$ million in 1965. Imports of yarn and thread were valued at $£ 5.5$ million in 1962, $£ 6.3$ million in 1963, $£ 8.6$ million in 1964 but fell to $£ 6.6$ million in 1965. The proportion of total textile imports which fabrics and made up articles represent has increased from 48 per cent to 50 per cent which is evident in the increase from $£ 12.7$ million to $£^{1} 14.6$ million between 1962 and 1965.

Summary data are given in Table E for the trade in petroleum products during the years 1961 to 1965. Refining started in this country in mid-1959 and an export trade in petroleum products developed. As there have also been considerable re-exports of such products for many years summary data on both domestic exports and on re-exports, in addition to those on imports, are given in Table E.

Over the five year period 1961-1965 the total value of imports of petroleum products has increased from $£ 18.2$ million to $£ 22.9$ million. Domestic exports $\AA 3.0$ million in 1961 , decreased to $£ 2.1$ million in 1962 , increased to $£ 2.3$ million in 1963, fell to $£ 1.7$ million in 1964 but rose again to $£ 2.5$ million in 1965. Re-exports of such products were valued at $\pm 2.5$ million in 1961 but fell to $£ 2.2$ million in 1962 and to $£ 1.7$ million in 1963 . An increase to $£ 1.9$ million and $£ 2.3$ million occurred in 1964 and 1965 respectively. Thus, offsetting domestic exports and re-exports against the cost of imports of petroleum products the net cost was $£ 12.8$ million in 1961, $£ 14.3$ million in $1962, £ 15.4$ million in 1963, $£ 17.4$ million in 1964 and $£ 18.1$ million in 1965.

## Exports of Certain Commodities

There was a marked drop in the exports of cattle in 1965. The estimated cattle equivalent of live and dead meat exports and live cattle imports is shown in Table F. The 1965 total live equivalent of cattle and beef exports, at 886,200 beasts, represents a fall of 191,400 compared with 1964 . Live cattle exports decreased by 197,000 and this is ascribable entirely to the decline in the exports of store cattle. In this category the decrease was 200,000 . Fat cattle exports remained almost steady at 146,300 head as also did beef exports at an estimated live equivalent of 289,500 head. Cattle imports at 101,400 were 46,200 less than in 1964 and the net export figure for the year of 784,800 represented a decrease of 145,100 on the 1964 level.

The total value of cattle exports in 1965 was $£ 44.7$ million, a decrease of $£ 10.1$ million on 1964. Exports of store bullocks fell by $£ 8.6$ million and store heifers by $£ 2.3$ million while there was an increase of $£ 0.4$ million in milch cows and springers. Exports of fresh or chilled beef rose by $£ 1.6$ million while frozen beef fell by $£ 0.7$ million to $£ 3.1$ million. Pork exports rose by $£ 2.2$ million to $£ 4.2$ million and bacon declined by $£ 0.5$ million to $£ 6.6$ million.

Table G shows the trend in exports of dairy products and eggs during the period 1961 to 1965. Cheese exports, which were valued at $£ 0.5$ million in 1961, have risen substantially each year and were worth $£ 2.5$ million in 1965. Butter has shown a rise from $£ 3.8$ million at the beginning of the period to $£ 7.0$ million in 1965 while milk (mainly dried or powdered) has risen from $£ 1.6$ million to £3.2 million.

Other divisions which have shown substantial increases during the five year period 1961 to 1965 include chemicals which rose from $£ 0.8$ million to $£ 4.8$ million; textile yarn, fabrics and made-up articles from $£ 6.6$ million to $£ 9.3$ million; non-electrical machinery from $£ 2.7$ million to $£ 4.1$ million; electrical machinery and equipment from $£ 1.3$ million ro $£ 3.9$ million and clothing and footwear from $£ 6.2$ million to $£ 8.6$ million.

## Exports of Agricultural Products

Table 128 shows the distribution of domestic exports between agricultural produce and other exports in each of the years 1961 to 1965. In this context the definition of agricultural produce adopted is that used in the Second Programme for Economic Expansion. The various constituents are listed in Appendix 2, Page 301 of Part II of that publication. Apart from a temporary recession in 1962 the value of agricultural forestry and fishing exports have risen substantially between 1961 and 1964. Between 1964 and 1965 there was a fall of $£ 6.8$ million and because of the faster growth in industrial exports the proportion of the total represented by agriculture fell from 57.0 per cent to 54.5 per cent.

## Trade by Areas

A comparison by areas of imports, exports and import excess is shown in Table 129. In the table "Other E.F.T.A. countries" refers to Austria, Denmark, Norway, Portugal, Sweden and Switzerland. " Member countries of the E.E.C." refers to Belgium, France, Germany (Federal Republic), Italy, Luxembourg and the Netherlands.

Total imports from the E.F.T.A. countries rose from $£ 191.0$ million in 1964 to $£ 201.8$ million in 1965 but the percentage share of this trading group fell from 54.7 to 54.3 per cent of all imports. Great Britain and the Six Counties accounted for $£ 187.9$ million of this, or 50.6 per cent of all imports, an increase of $£ 10.1$ million over the 1964 total, while imports from the rest of the E.F.T.A. countries increased from $£ 13.2$ million in 1964 to $£ 13.8$ million in 1965 , representing 3.7 per cent of our total import trade, compared with 3.8 per cent in 1964.

Ireland imported $£ 56.7$ million worth of goods from the E.E.C. countries, an increase of $£^{2} .6$ million over the previous year's figure. The E.E.C. share of total imports fell from 15.5 per cent in 1964 to 15.3 per cent in 1965.

The Dollar Area imports increased from $£ 35.1$ million in 1964 to $£ 40.1$ million in 1965 , U.S. imports rising from $£ 26.8$ million to $£ 29.8$ million while imports from Canada rose from $£ 7.6$ million to $£ 9.7$ million. Imports from "All Other Areas " rose from $£ 56.7$ million in 1964 to $£ 61.0$ million in 1965.

Exports to the E.F.T.A. countries fell from $£ 161.7$ million in 1964 to $£ 157.1$ million in 1965, which total represents 71.1 per cent of all exports. Great Britain and the Six Counties took $£ 153.8$ million of this, representing 69.6 per cent of all exports. Exports to the remaining E.F.T.A. member countries were $£ 3.3$ million in 1965, an increase of $£ 0.1$ million on the previous year.

Member countries of the E.E.C. took $\hbar^{2} 8.4$ million of our goods in 1965, an increase of $£ 2.9$ million on the previous year's total, while the percentage share of this trading group rose from 11.5 per cent to 12.9 per cent of our total exports. Exports to Germany (Federal Republic) at $£ 11.8$ million were up by $£ 2.8$ million on the 1964 figure. Dollar Area exports fell from $£ 15.8$ million in 1964 to $£ 13.8$ million in 1965. Exports to "All Other Areas" increased by $\AA 1.8$ million to $£ 10.6$ million in 1965.

The Import Excess with the E.F.T.A. group rose from $£ 29.4$ million in 1964 to $f 44.9$ million in 1965. The import excess with Great Britain rose from $f 32.8$ million in 1964 to $f 46.2$ million in 1965 , but the export excess to the Six Counties fell $£ 1.6$ million to a total of $£ 11.8$ million for 1965 . The 1965 figure for the import excess for the E.E.C. trading group stood at $£ 28.3$ million, compared with $£ 28.7$ million in the previous year. The Dollar Area import

excess rose $£ 7.2$ million to $£ 26.4$ million in 1965 and the excess of imports from "All Other Areas" rose from $£ 47.9$ million in 1964 to $£ 50.5$ million in 1965 an increase of $£ 2.6$ million in the year.

The result of these movements was to raise the import excess by $£ 23.6$ million to a figure of $£ 150.9$ million for the year under review.

## Section VI. Internal Trade.

## Censuses of Distribution

The Census of Distribution for 1933 was the first complete inquiry of its kind to be made in Ireland and the results were published in an official report (P. No. 2302) which is now out of print; a short summary was given in the "Statistical Abstract of Ireland" for 1937, 1938 and 1939. The Census of Distribution for 1951 which was the next complete inquiry was wider in scope than the 1933 inquiry: it included certain service trades which were previously excluded and its coverage of wholesale trading was rather more complete. There were also certain changes in the treatment of mixed businesses. The results of the 1951 Census were published in an official report "Census of Distribution 1951-54 " (Pr. 3362).

A Census of all establishments engaged during the year 1956 in wholesale and retail trading and the provision of certain services was carried out in 1957. Sample surveys of wholesale and retail trading have been made for the years 1957 to 1960. Preliminary reports giving the principal results for each of the years 1956 to 1960 were published in the "Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin" in the quarterly issues commencing with September 1958. A comprehensive analysis of the results of the 1956 Census together with the detailed tables for that year and summaries for 1957 to 1959 have been published in the official report "Census of Distribution 1956-1959" (Pr. 5760). This report also contains a general description of the purpose and scope of the Census and a brief description of the methods used to estimate wholesale and retail sales, purchases etc. in 1957 and subsequent years by means of sampling.

In the tables which follow, figures are given for the year 1956 and in some cases for the years 1959 and 1960. The figures for retail trade have been set out in Tables 135-141; wholesale trading is dealt with in Tables 142-147. Table 149 relates to the principal service-type trades. The figures for 1956-1960 are not comparable with those for 1951-1955 given in previous issues of the Abstract, principally because the coverage of the basic register of establishments was more complete in 1956 than in 1951, because of different response rates and because of the different treatment of the larger concerns dealing in both retail and wholesale trade. Prior to 1956 such concerns were included either as wholesale or retail depending on which type of sale predominated, whereas for 1956 they were split into two separate businesses for the purpose of the Census.

## The Retail Trade in 1956, 1959 and 1960

In 1956 some 40,900 retail shops were recorded in Ireland-about one for every seventy persons. This figure includes public houses and garages, but excludes hotels, restaurants, hairdressers, betting establishments, cinemas and other service establishments. Completed Census forms were received for the year 1956 from 33,459 retail establishments ( 81.8 per cent of the 40,913 recorded in the registers). All figures for sales, purchases, stocks, gross margin, wages and salaries, persons engaged and accounts receivable as set out in Tables 135-141 relate only to the 33,459 establishments "included in the Census" and do not make any allowance for the other 7,400 "non-respondent" establishments. The 33,459 "included" retail establishments had total 1956 sales of $£ 243$ milion, of which $£ 238$ million was retail sales and $£ 5$ million ancillary wholesale sales. Their total purchases cost $£ 200$ million and during 1956 their stocks increased from $£ 32$ million to $£ 33$ million. Their "gross margin" (sales less purchases plus increases in stocks during the year) was $£ 44$ million or 18 per cent of their total sales.

Details of these aggregates for different descriptions of business are shown in Table 136, together with figures for the total wages and salaries paid to employees. The amounts shown, which include payments to all employees engaged in the establishments at any time during the year, comprise wages, salaries and commission paid to employees, but they exclude expenses allowances. Directors of limited companies who actually worked in the business are classified as employees.

Amounts drawn out of the business by proprietors and occasional payments to members of their families are excluded from the figures shown for wages and salaries. For the first time in the Census of Distribution inquiries, particulars of accounts receivable at the end of the year were obtained and Table 136 sets out the details. Also for the first time particulars of persons under 18 years of age at work in shops were obtained. These are set out in Tables 137 and 138.

Table 137 shows that a total of 110,205 persons $(60,093$ males and 50,112 females) were engaged in retail establishments included in the Census in the week ended 14 April, 1956. Proprietors working in the business accounted for 29,750 or 27 per cent of the 110,205 persons engaged; 14,627 persons or 13 per cent of the total were described as members of the family who received no definite wage or salary for their work; the number of paid employees was 65,828 or 60 per cent of the total persons engaged. Particulars of full-time and part-time paid employees are given in Table 138.

The data of Table 139 indicate that almost one-third ( 32 per cent) of retail shops were one-man concerns but such concerns had less than one-twentieth ( 4.5 per cent) of total sales. Shops with 5 to 9 persons engaged were about one-eighth of the total number ( 11.9 per cent) and accounted for the largest portion of total sales ( 25.9 per cent). The 204 shops having 30 or more persons in each accounted for more than one-sixth ( 17.5 per cent) of total sales.

Table 140 indicates that almost nine-tenths ( 87.9 per cent) of the retail establishments included in the Census were individual proprietorships, accounting for over half ( 52.9 per cent) of total sales. Partnerships accounted for less than one-tenth of total number and total sales. Private limited companies though less than one-tenth ( 5.6 per cent) in number had almost one-third ( 30.7 per cent) of total sales. The other categories combined accounted for less than one-tenth ( 9.2 per cent) of total sales.

It is seen in Table 141 that no less than 9,735 (or 29 per cent) of the total 33,459 "included " retail establishments had an annual turnover of less than $£ 1,000$ per year in 1956-less than $£ 20$ a week; between them they accounted for $f 4.21$ million or only 1.8 per cent of total sales in 1956. At the other end of the scale there were only 39 retail establishments of all kinds with an annual turnover of $£^{250,000}$ or more in 1956 but these accounted for $£ 22$ million or 9.0 per cent of total retail sales.

For included establishments total sales were $£ 15.8$ million or 6.5 per cent higher in 1959 than in 1956 (Table 135). There was a further increase of $£ 10.7$ million between 1959 and 1960. The figure for total sales includes ancillary receipts for meals and services, e.g. payments made by the Department of Posts and Telegraphs to sub-post offices.

## The Wholesale Trade in 1956, 1959 and 1960

There were some 2,401 wholesale establishments recorded as being in the State during 1956 and completed Census forms were received from 2,141 or 89 per cent of all establishments. These 2,141 establishments were sub-divided into 1,902 trading on their own account only and 239 establishments trading mainly on commission i.e. Manufacturers' Agents.

All figures in Tables 143-147 are for the year 1956 and relate to the 2,141 wholesale establishments of both kinds included in the 1956 Census; they do not make any allowance for the other 260 " non-respondent" establishments i.e. Tables 143-147 give particulars for the 2,141 "included" establishments of both kinds relating to the Census year 1956.

For 1956 total sales on own account by the 2,141 establishments of both kinds amounted to $£ 207$ million while sales on commission totalled $£ 18.5$ million. Purchases during the year were $£ 178$ million. Stocks decreased from $£ 30.4$ million at the beginning of the year to $£ 30.1$ million at the end of the year. Gross margin plus commission received amounted to $£ 29.5$ million or 14 per cent of total sales; $£ 11.2$ million was paid in wages and salaries during 1956.

Table 144 shows that a total of 28,067 persons ( 21,093 males and 6,974 females) were engaged in the 2,141 wholesale trading establishments in April, 1956. Proprietors working in the business numbered 939 . There were 26,867 paid employees (including directors working in the business).

It can be seen in Table 145 that the total number of establishments was fairly evenly spread among the size categories specified, except for the size group " 5 to 9 persons engaged " which accounted for about one-fourth of all establishments and one-eighth of total sales. The 185 establishments having 30 or more persons engaged accounted for more than two-fifths (41.1 per cent) of total sales.

As is indicated in Table 146 the two most important forms of ownership in 1956 were individual proprietorships and private limited companies, each accounting for about two-fifths of the total number of establishments. Shops of the latter category had 55 per cent of total sales as compared with 12 per cent by shops which were individual proprietorships. The 139 public limited companies had about one-fifth of total sales.

An analysis of the number of establishments and their total sales by size of 1956 turnover is presented in Table 147. Only 9 per cent of the establishments had an annual turnover of $£ 250,000$ and over, but these accounted for more than one-half ( 53 per cent) of total sales. While 56 per cent of the establishments had an annual turnover of less than $£ 50,000$, their combined sales accounted for only 10.5 per cent of total sales.

Table 142, gives particulars for the 1,902 wholesale establishments trading only on own account for the years 1956, 1959 and 1960. Manufacturers' Agents are excluded from Table 142 and there is no allowance for "non-respondent" establishments.

For Grain and Forage establishments in Table 142 the 1959 and 1960 figures are not comparable with those of 1956. In 1956 Grain Importers Ltd. was in operation but its activities were excluded from the Census results. In 1959, however, the company ceased to operate and the activities of other establishments engaged in this type of trading expanded accordingly. A substantial amount of the increases shown in Grain and Forage for 1959 and 1960 compared with 1956 results from this change in structure rather than from an expansion.

## The Principal Service Trades in 1956

Table 149 sets out certain items of data relating to hotels and guest-houses, catering and hairdressing establishments and cinemas, for the year 1956. The figures for total receipts, purchases, etc. relate only to those establishments included in the Census.

## Index Numbers of Value of Retail Sales

A statistical inquiry on monthly retail sales was initiated in 1962. The basic monthly returns are furnished on a voluntary basis by a representative sample of approximately 1,100 retail establishments.

The results of the inquiry for annual and quarterly periods up to March 1966 and for each month from January 1964 are presented in Tables 148 (a) and 148 (b). The results are in the form of index numbers designed to measure from one period to another the changes in the level of the value of average weekly sales. Since the index numbers measure changes in value they reflect both the effect of changes in the volume of sales and changes in retail prices. The sales values on which the index numbers are based have included turnover tax since November 1963. In addition to the series for overall retail sales (i.e. All Description Combined) separate index numbers are given for each of 14 different descriptions of business (i.e. types of shop). In table 148 (a) the average weekly sales for the whole year 1961 has been used as the base (100) against which the levels of weekly sales in the various periods have been assessed. The series of figures for the months shown indicate the extent of seasonal variations in retail sales. For All Descriptions Combined the lowest levels of sales occur in the early months of the year and the highest levels are recorded in December. A strong seasonality is evident, the level of sales in the first quarter of each year being from 10 to 12 per cent below the annual level with a correspondingly high level of sales in the fourth quarter.

It is also of interest to compare the level of sales in any period with the level of sales in the corresponding period of the previous year and this has been done in Table 148 (b). For All Descriptions Combined weekly sales were higher in each month of 1965 than in the corresponding month of 1964, the greatest increase being shown in January ( $12 \%$ ). Similarly for most of the months of 1965 the levels of sales for individual descriptions of business were generally higher than the corresponding sales in 1964, the number of exceptions (decreases) being small. In interpreting the changes between 1963 and 1964 for the months of October and November it should be noted that the sales index for October 1963 was unusually high, and that for November 1963 was low due probably in the main to the payment of outstanding bills and additional purchases in advance of the introduction of the turnover tax in November 1963.

For the year 1965 as a whole the index shows that the average weekly sales for All Descriptions Combined were 6 per cent higher than for the year 1964: for individual types of shop the increase varied from 11 per cent for Department Stores to 3 per cent for Boots and Shoes.

Because of the exclusion of the smaller shops from the retail trade covered by the monthly inquiry the extent of increases in retail sales over a period of years between full Censuses of Distribution may be somewhat exaggerated by the index series as it is believed that the expansion in larger shops is not being paralleled by the smaller shops. This bias in intercensal periods may be counteracted to the extent that sales in new shops, opened between Census years are not taken into account.

In the March 1965 issue of the Irish Statistical Bulletin a description of the selection of the basic sample of shops and of the coverage and method of computation of the index has been published.

The number of houses built under State-aided schemes in the year ended 31 March, 1966 was 10,787 compared with 9,279 in the previous year as may be seen from Table 151. The number of old houses reconstructed with State aid was 8,818 in the year ended 31 March, 1966 compared with 9,062 in the previous year. The number of houses built by Local Authorities under Stateaided schemes which had exceeded 7,000 per annum in the years 1951 to 1953, thereafter tended to decline, the lowest number in recent years being 1,238 in the year ended 31 March, 1962. This number rose to 2,307 in the year ended 31 March, 1965, and to 2,989 in year ended 31 March, 1966. State grants and contributions made in respect of new and reconstructed houses in the year ended 31 March, 1966 was $£ 5.9$ million, compared with $£ 5.6$ million in the previous year (Table 152).

Table 153 shows private dwellings classified by period in which built, this information being derived from the 1961 Census of Population. Excluding the " not stated" cases, 24 per cent of the dwellings were built before 1860, 22 per cent from 1860 to 1899,12 per cent from 1900 to 1918, 19 per cent from 1919 to 1939, 4 per cent from 1940 to 1945 and 19 per cent from 1946 to the date of the Census in 1961. Tables 157 and 158 also based on the 1961 Census of Population, indicate a marked improvement in the general housing conditions of the population in the interval 1946 to 1961. The average number of persons per room in 1961 was 0.90 , compared with 1.01 in 1946 and 1.09 in 1936. The overcrowded section of the population (those living in a housing density of more than two persons per room) declined from 22.5 per cent of the total in private families in 1936 to 16.8 per cent in 1946 and 11.5 per cent in 1961. The average number of persons per room in Dublin County Borough declined from 1.14 in 1946 to 0.93 in 1961, the overcrowded section declining from 27.3 to 14.0 per cent.

## Social Amenities

At the Census of Population in 1961 occupants of private dwellings were asked to furnish information relating to the nature of the occupancy of the dwelling, the amount of rent, if the dwelling were rented, and also the nature of the water supply and sanitary facilities of the dwelling. The information obtained for each County and County Borough is summarised in Tables 159 to 162 .

There were 676,402 private dwellings and, of those, 36 per cent were rented, the remainder being owned by the occupier or occupied on special terms. About two thirds of the private dwellings in Dublin County Borough were rented and of these almost half were rented from the Local Authority. Over the whole country the average monthly rent was about 77s. (including rates and ground rent). In Dublin County Borough the average rent was 102s. and in Dun Laoghaire Borough 123s.

Of the 676,402 private dwellings 44 per cent had a tap from the public water main inside the building, while 6 per cent relied on a tap from the public main outside the building only. A private piped supply was available in the case of 7 per cent of the dwellings, while 43 per cent of the dwellings used a well, fountain, pump or other source. The number of private dwellings having a flush lavatory was 361,946 or 53.5 per cent of the total, compared with 38.5 per cent in 1946. Dwellings without special sanitary facilities represented 35 per cent of the total, compared with 48 per cent in 1946.

## Unemployment

Statistics of unemployment in this section are derived from the administration of the Social Welfare, Unemployment Assistance and Labour Exchanges Acts. The Social Welfare Acts established a social insurance scheme for employees providing for the payment of various benefits including Unemployment Benefit. Subject to certain exceptions, Social Insurance is compulsory for persons between the ages of 16 and 70 years who are employed in any employment which is insurable under the Acts.

Insurable employments include employment under any contract of service or apprenticeship, employment in the civil service of the Government or of the State or under any local or public authority or in share-fishing or as an outworker.

The principal exceptions are (i) non-manual workers whose earnings are in excess of a specified amount ( $£ 600$ to 23 rd December, 1958; $£ 800$ from that date to 6 September, 1965 when the limit was raised to $£ 1,200$ ) (ii) persons employed by their own husbands or wives and (iii) persons in specified professions and in certain employments of a casual nature or of a subsidiary nature. However Civil Servants, national and secondary teachers, officers and servants of local and public authorities and employees of statutory transport undertakings who are employed in permanent and pensionable employments are compulsorily insured only in respect of widows and orphans pensions. They are not insured for Unemployment Benefit on the grounds that they enjoy permanency of employment, adequate sick leave privileges and pensions when they retire. The statistics in Tables 164 to 174 exclude these categories. Employment contributions are paid by affixing a social insurance stamp to the worker's card for each week during which he is employed in insurable employment. A contribution may be credited for each week of incapacity due to sickness and for each week of proved unemployment.

Persons who are not insured against unemployment and persons who have exhausted their right to Unemploymnet Benefit may receive Unemployment Assistance provided they satisfy a means test and a residence condition.

Persons claiming Unemployment Benefit or seeking credited contributions while unemployed and persons applying for Unemployment Assistance must register for employment. In addition any person over school leaving age may register for employment at his nearest Local Office under the Labour Exchanges Act. Up to 3 January, 1966, the current total number of persons registering at Local Offices of the Department of Social Welfare constituted what was known as the Live Register. Small farmers are entitled to payment of assistance under the Unemployment Assistance Acts if their income is below a certain statutory limit. In general these are underemployed rather than unemployed in the commonly accepted sense of the term. A new system of assessing the means of smallholders in certain western areas, under the Unemployment Assistance Acts, came into operation on 3 January, 1966. The effect of the new system would have been to increase considerably the number of smallholders registering and accordingly to distort the total Live Register. As it was not feasible to distinguish between the number of smallholder applicants under the new system and those who were eligible under the former system, the Live Register total excludes, as from January, 1966, persons who are the beneficial occupiers of agricultural land (with the exception of those whose land consists solely of a plot attached to a labourer's cottage) and who either (a) are applicants for Unemployment Assistance or (b) are signing on for credits having been in receipt of Unemployment Assistance but who were disqualified from Assistance by an Employment Period Order. In addition, applicants for credits due to a trade dispute and students at school or college and other persons at work who are signing on for temporary seasonal employment are also excluded. The total Live Register figures for 1966 are therefore not comparable with those for previous years. A full description of the changes and the reasons for them appeared in an article in the December, 1965 issue of the Irish Statistical Bulletin.

Of the three categories on the Live Register given in Table 168, (i) claimants to Unemployment Benefit (ii) applicants for Unemployment Assistance and (iii) Others, comparison of the 1966 figures with those for previous years can be made only in the case of claimants to Unemployment Benefit. While the occupational group (Table 170) mainly affected by the change is that of farmer,
certain other groups such as Construction workers and general agricultural labourers may also be affected as the occupational classification is made according to the normal occupation. Smallholders may therefore be classed in occupations other than farmers. The percentages unemployed classified by industrial group (Table 171) and by month (Table 172) are only marginally affected by the change as Agriculture, the industry most affected, has always been excluded in the calculations. The percentages are obtained by expressing the number of currently insured persons on the Live Register as a percentage of the estimated insured population.

Each year two Employment Period Orders have the effect of excluding from the Live Register the following classes of persons residing in rural areas (a) occupiers of agricultural land, the rateable valuation of which exceeds $£ 4$ from about mid-March to the end of October and (b) men without dependants from about mid-June to the end of October.

The numbers of insurance cards current during the years 1962 to 1965 are given in Table 164. Under the Social Welfare Act, 1952, insured persons are required to surrender their cards each year for a new insurance card and the total of these cards exchanged plus new cards issued to persons becoming insured for the first time represents cards current. The insurance year for males covers the period from January to January and for females the period July to July. A classification of these insured persons by industry is given in Table 166. An abstract of accounts of the Social Insurance Fund is given in Table 177. In the year ended 31 March, 1965 the contribution income of the Social Fund from employers and insured persons was $£ 14.9$ million and State grants amounted to $£ 9.6$ million. Total benefits paid under the Contributory Social Insurance Scheme during the same period amounted to $£ 23.6$ million.

Widows' and Orphans' Pensions and Children's Allowances
The number of beneficiaries (Widows' and Orphans' Pensions) at 31 December, 1965 was: Widows, 63,706; dependent children of widows, 20,790; orphans, 597 (Table 175). Widows' and Orphans' pensions and allowances, including non-contributory pensions paid during the year ended 31 March, 1965 amounted to $£ 6.8$ million (Tables 177-178). The total cost of old age (contributory and non-contributory) and blind pensions in the year ended 31 March was $£ 15.5$ million in 1964 and $£ 17.0$ million in 1965. The number of persons in receipt of such pensions was 152,000 in 1965 and 153,000 in 1966 (Tables 177, 178, 179, 180).

Under the Social Welfare (Children's Allowances) Acts, the head of a household in which there is one or more children under the age of 16 years may receive children's allowances. Prior to 1st November, 1963 these allowances were limited to households with two or more children. A total of 315,000 families were in receipt of allowances under the scheme at 31 December, 1965 while the cost of the allowances in the year ended 31 December, 1965 was $£ 10.2$ million (Table 183).

## Local Health Services and Public Assistance

Under the Health Acts many of the services provided for the lower income group of the population have been improved and extended and certain new services have been introduced. In the year ended March, the cost of institutional services amounted to $£ 19.9$ million in 1965 and $£ 22.0$ million in 1966, while the cost of non-institutional services for these years was $£ 7.9$ million and $£ 9.1$ million respectively.

To meet the cost of these services each health authority receives a grant from central funds equal to the amount by which total expenditure on health services exceeds total net expenditure in 1947-48 (the Standard Year) up to the point at which current expenditure is twice the Standard Year's expenditure. Beyond that point expenditure is recouped to the extent of 50 per cent (Table 184). Home assistance, administered and financed by Local Authorities, is under the general control and direction of the Minister for Social Welfare. The number of persons in receipt of home assistance at the end of March, 1964, was 29,412, and 1965, 29,791 whilst the cost of the assistance, in the year ended 31 March, in 1964 was $£ 1,020,000$ and in $1965 £_{1} 1,174,000$ (Tables 181 and 182).

## Maternity Cash Grants

Maternity cash grants are payable under the Health Act, 1953 at the rate of $£ 4$ per confinement to women in the lower income group. The number of applications granted in the year ended 31 March was 17,949 in 1965 and 17,085 in 1966 (Table 188).

## Infectious Diseases and Disabled Persons (Maintenance) Allowances

Infectious diseases allowances are payable under the Health Act, 1947. The number of persons in receipt of such allowances at 31 March in the years 1965 and 1966 was 1,886 and 1,731 respectively. These figures mainly cover persons suffering from tuberculosis. Total allowances paid in the consecutive years ended 31 March was $£ 197,000$ in 1965 and $£ 200,000$ in 1966. The Health Act, 1953, provided for payment of allowances to disabled persons. The number of persons in receipt of such allowances at 31 March, 1966 was 18,860 and the cost of the allowances in the year ended on that date was $£ 1,593,000$ (Table 188).

## Industrial Disputes

Particulars of Industrial Disputes, involving stoppages of work, are given in Table 190 for the years 1963 to 1965. The number of disputes which began in 1965 was 89 compared with 87 in 1964. The number of work-people involved and man-days lost in disputes in progress was 39,745 and 556,475 respectively in 1965 compared with 25,245 and 545,384 respectively in 1964. In 1965 three disputes, one in Food, drink and tobacco, one in Printing and paper and one in Transport and communication involved 18,993 work-people and accounted for 451,630 or 81 per cent of the total man-days lost.

## Accidents

There were 4,076 road accidents in 1965 resulting in personal injury- 342 fatal and 3,734 non-fatal. The corresponding number of accidents for 1964 was 3,820 of which 319 were fatal. Of the fatal accidents which occurred in 1965 almost 23 per cent were in the Dublin Metropolitan Garda Area (as constituted after its extension in 1964) whilst over 26 per cent of the non-fatal accidents occurred in the same area compared with 21 per cent and over 28 per cent respectively for this area in 1964. The number of persons killed in road accidents in 1965 was 356 and the number injured was 5,311 ; the corresponding figures for 1964 were 341 persons killed and 4,864 injured. The total number of persons killed or injured in road accidents in 1965 was 5,667 and of these almost 29 per cent were in the age group 15-24 years and more than 16 per cent in the 25-34 year age group.

A new category at $7 / 6$ rate was introduced.

## Section VIII. Education.

Expenditure on education from public funds has increased progressively over many years past to a level of $£ 31.0$ million in 1964-65 when it stood $£ 6.1$ million or 24 per cent higher than in the previous year and $£ 12.7$ million or 70 per cent higher than in 1960-61. The growing expenditure has been relatively heavier on secondary and vocational education than on that of primary.

Of total current expenditure on education from public funds in 1941 (excluding University and Colleges, Agricultural schools and the Dublin Institute for advanced studies) the primary branch received 73 per cent, the secondary branch, 9.7 per cent and the vocational branch 10.6 per cent. In 1965 the respective proportions received were, 61 per cent, 19 per cent and 13 per cent. Of the total of $£ 16.5$ million expended in 1965 on primary education, 14.3 million or 86 per cent represented the cost of teachers' salaries.

The total number of teachers employed in primary schools in 1965 was 14,843 , or 110 more than in the previous year (Table 199). The ratio of male to female (trained) teachers was roughly 4 to 8 and, in the case of untrained teachers, 1 to 10. The number of students in training colleges was 999 (Table 200).

## Primary Education

The number of national schools in operation in 1964-65 was 4,847; the number in 1963-64 was 4,848 . The average number of pupils on the rolls in 1964-65 was 490,000 as compared with 487,000 in the previous year. The number of catholic pupils on the rolls increased from 489,000 in 1963-64 to 493,000 in 1964-65. The number of pupils of other religious denominations increased from 12,800 in 1963-64 to 13,300 in 1964-65.

The trends in the average daily attendance since 1925-26 are illustrated in Diagram 1. The increase shown between 1925-27 was due mainly to the raising of the school-leaving age. The percentage of average daily attendance to the average number of pupils on the rolls varied from 87.3 per cent to 91.7 per cent over the past five years.

## Secondary Education

The number of pupils attending recognised secondary schools in 1965-66 was 98,667 . This figure represents an increase of 5,678 on the previous year's numbers and an increase of 21,824 on the 1960-61 figures. The number of these pupils attending Irish and bilingual schools in 1965-66 was 39,093 or 40 per cent. In the Leaving Certificate examination some 1,627 boys or 31 per cent of boy entrants and 2,139 girls or 40 per cent of girl entrants obtained honours. The respective honours figures in the Intermediate Certificate Examination were: 4,358 or 57 per cent and 4,531 or 45 per cent. The number of teachers in secondary schools at 31 July, 1966 was 6,795 or 318 more than in the previous year. Some 4,302 of the teachers were registered and 2,493 were unregistered. The overall ratio of male to female teachers was approximately 7 : 9 (Tables 203-205).

## Vocational Education

The number of students on the rolls of vocational schools in 1964-65 was $104,323,4,354$ more than in 1963-64. The number of students enrolled in the Dublin County Borough and in the Borough of Dún Laoghaire represented 29 per cent of total enrolments and the number of students enrolled in the four County Boroughs and in the Borough of Dún Laoghaire constituted 41 per cent of total enrolments. Thirty eight per cent of the students were under 16 years of age and 62 per cent (Table 207) were over 16 years.

## University Education

The trend in the number of students, men and women, in attendance at the National University of Ireland and Dublin University since 1909-10 is shown in Diagram 2. The total number of students at Universities (Table 213) in the academic year 1964-65 was 14,661 . This figure represents an increase of 833 on student numbers in the previous year and an increase of 5,262 or 56 per cent on those in 1958-59. Male student numbers increased in 1964-65 by 445 or by 5 per cent whilst female student numbers increased by 388 or by 9 per cent on the previous year's figures. The number of full-time students who entered the two Universities for the first time in 1964-65 was 3,579 . Prior to $1955-56$ the number of these full-time entrants fluctuated considerably, but since then there has been a decidedly progressive increase in numbers.

Over the six academic years 1959-60-1964-65 the most popular faculty was that of Arts, while next in popularity was the faculty of medicine (including pre-medical and pre-dental). Art students numbered more than one-third while Arts and medical students combined comprised more than half the total number of students. Over this period some variations occurred in student numbers in the different faculties. Science students rose from 1,336 to 1,837 . Arts students increased from 3,526 to 5,251 . In the Commerce faculty numbers increased from 683 to 992 while veterinary students rose from 345 to 350 . The numbers of engineering, medical and architectural students increased from 699 to 1,035 , from 1,052 to 1,484 and from 92 to 146 respectively. The student numbers in the faculties of Agriculture and Forestry and Dairy Science increased from 483 to 586. The income and expenditure of the Universities is summarised in Table 217. Total income increased in 1963-64 to $£ 4.14$ million; income in 1958-59 amounted to $£ 1.61$ million. Parliamentary grants, the main source of income, totalled $£ 1.57$ million in 1963-64. Tuition fees, which amounted to $£ 1.05$ million in the same year represented 36 per cent of total current income; in 1958-59 tuition fees amounted to $£ 0.55$ million or 36 per cent of total current income. In 1963-64 total expenditure amounted to $£ 4.28$ million. The heaviest item of current expenditure was, expectedly, the salaries of teaching staff (including superannuation payments) which amounted to $£ 1.42$ million or 51 per cent of total expenditure. In 1958-59, salary and superannuation payments totalled $£ 0.72$ million or 50 per cent of total expenditure.

## Section IX. Justice and Defence.

## The Legal System.

The Constitution provides that Justice shall be administered in public in Courts established by law by Judges appointed by the President on the advice of the Government. It is further laid down that these Courts shall consist of Courts of First Instance and a Court of Final Appeal. The Courts of First Instance are the High Court with full original jurisdiction and the Circuit and District Courts with local and limited jurisdiction. The judges of all Courts are, under the Constitution, completely independent in the exercise of their judicial functions and their remuneration may not be reduced during their terms of office. A Judge may not be removed from office except for stated misbehaviour or incapacity and then only on resolutions passed by both Houses of the Oireachtas (or Parliament). Judges of the Supreme, High and Circuit Courts are appointed from among practising barristers. Judges of the District Court (styled Justices of the District Court) may be appointed from among practising barristers or practising solicitors. The jurisdiction and organisation of the Courts are dealt with in the Courts (Establishment and Constitution) Act, 1961, and the Courts (Supplemental Provisions) Act, 1961.

The Supreme Court, which consists of the Chief Justice (who is ex officio an additional judge of the High Court) and four ordinary Judges, has appellate jurisdiction from all decisions of the High Court and on questions of law from all decisions of the Circuit Court in Workmen's Compensation cases. The President may, after consultation with the Council of State, refer a Bill which has been passed by both Houses of the Oireachtas to the Supreme Court for a decision on the question as to whether such Bill or any provision or provisions thereof is or are repugnant to the Constitution. The High Court, which consists of the President of the High Court (who is ex officio an additional judge of the Supreme Court) and six ordinary judges, has full original jurisdiction in and power to determine all matters and questions, whether of law or fact, civil or criminal. In all cases in which questions arise touching the validity of any law having regard to the provisions of the Constitution, the High Court alone exercises original jurisdiction. The High Court on Circuit acts as an appeal court from the Circuit Court. The Court of Criminal Appeal consists of the Chief Justice or an ordinary Judge of the Supreme Court and two ordinary judges of the High Court or the President and one ordinary Judge of the High Court. It deals with appeals by persons convicted on indictment where the appellant obtains a certificate from the trial Judge that the case is a fit one for appeal or in case such certificate is refused, where the Court itself, on appeal from such refusal, grants leave to appeal. The appeal is heard and determined on the report of the official stenographer present at the trial with power to the Court to hear further evidence, or to refer any matter back for report by the trial judge. The Court may affirm or reverse the conviction in whole or in part or vary the sentence or order a new trial. The decision of the Court of Criminal Appeal is final unless the Court or the Attorney General certifies that the decision involves a point of law of exceptional public importance and that it is desirable in the public interest that an appeal should be taken to the Supreme Court. The Central Criminal Court consists of a Judge or Judges of the High Court to whom is assigned for the time being the duty of acting as such Court. The Court sits at such times and in such places as the President of the High Court may direct and tries criminal cases which are outside the jurisdiction of the Circuit Court, or which may be sent forward for trial from the Circuit Court on the application of the Attorney General or the accused person.

The country is divided into eight circuits for the purposes of the Circuit Court. A Circuit Judge is assigned to each circuit and two Circuit Judges to the Dublin Circuit. The President of the Circuit Court is ex-officio an additional Judge of the High Court. The civil jurisdiction of the Circuit

Court is limited to $£ 600$ in contract and tort, $£ 1,000$ in hire-purchase and credit-sale agreement proceedings and $£ 2,000$ in equity (including probate and administration) but where the parties consent the jurisdiction is unlimited. In criminal matters the Court has jurisdiction in all cases except murder, treason, piracy and allied offences. The Circuit Court acts as an appeal court from the District Court.

The District Court has a summary jurisdiction in a large number of criminal cases where the offence is not of a serious nature. In civil matters the Court has jurisdiction in contract and tort (except slander, libel, criminal conversation, seduction, slander of title, malicious prosecution and false imprisonment) where the claim does not exceed $f_{50} 5$. In hire-purchase and credit-sale agreement proceedings the jurisdiction in limited to $£ 100$. For the purposes of the Court the country is divided into twenty-four districts.

All criminal cases except those dealt with summarily by a Justice in the District Court are tried by a Judge and a jury of twelve. Juries are also used in very many civil cases. In a criminal case the jury must be unanimous in reaching a verdict but in a civil case the agreement of nine members is sufficient.

## Court Business

In the High Court of Justice 1,245 summary summonses were issued in the legal year 1964-65 compared with 1,123 in 1963-64. Plenary summonses issued in 1964-65 numbered 2,576 compared with 2,258 in 1963-64. The total amount in 1964-65 recovered by verdicts was $£ 1,128,000$ (Table 219).

The number of new cases entered in the Circuit Courts in the legal year 1964-65 was 21,539 compared with 21,777 in 1963-64.

The number of indictable offences which were reported or became known to the Gardai in the year ended 30 September, 1965, was 16,736 compared with 17,700 in the year ended 30 September, 1964. The 16,736 offences were comprised of 1,113 cases of offences against the person; 4,213 cases of offences against property with violence; 11,014 cases of offences against property without violence and 396 cases of other indictable offences (Table 222).

The number of persons prosecuted for non-indictable offences in 1965 was 139,856 compared with 120,715 in 1964. Some 113,184 cases or 81 per cent of the prosecutions in 1965 were for offences under the Highway Acts (Table 223). Tables 224 and 226 show the results of proceedings for indictable and non-indictable offences respectively. Prosecutions for offences under the Intoxicating Liquor Laws numbered 7,189 in 1965 compared with 6,369 in 1964 (Tables 228 and 229).

The daily average number of persons in custody was 397 in 1965 compared with 407 in 1964. The number of criminal prisoners convicted in 1965 was 1,711 compared with 1,626 in 1964 and the number of sentences imposed was 1,923 compared with 1,791 in 1964.

The daily average number of persons in custody in St. Patrick's Institution was 164 in 1965 compared with 166 in 1964, and the number of sentences imposed was 561 compared with 575 in 1964.

## Defence Forces

The total number of all ranks in the Defence Forces on 31 March, 1966 was 8,159 , comprising 1,122 commissioned officers, 2,968 non-commissioned officers, 4,005 privates and 64 cadets, compared with a total of all ranks of 8,199 in 1965 (Table 234). Numbers in the Reserve included 509 in the Reserve of Officers and 1,942 in the Reserve of Men-First Line. Reserve, all ranks numbered 19,047 in 1966.

## Garda Síochána

The strength of the Garda Síochána on 30 June, 1965 and 1966 was 6,568 and 6,545 respectively.

## Section X. Finance.

## National Income and Expenditure

Detailed statistics of national income and expenditure were included for the first time in the 1951 issue of the Statistical Abstract, and have been included each year since then. From time to time revisions have been made in the figures published, arising from changes in concepts and methods. This year further improvements have been made in both concepts and methods of estimation. For particulars of these revisions and for precise definition and content of the items in the tables see Appendix 1 of " National Income and Expenditure, 1965 " (Pr. 9379) compiled by the Central Statistics Office and published by the Stationery Office (price 4 s .6 d .).

## National Income

In 1964 the National Income was $£ 767$ million compared with $£ 485$ million in 1958 representing a rise of 58.3 per cent. The preliminary figure of $\{817$ million for 1965 shows an increase of 6.5 per cent compared with the 1964 level. These figures are at current money values.

Gross national product at current market prices (Table 238) increased from £601 million in 1958 to $£ 952$ million in 1964 and to $£ 1,018$ million in 1965. These figures are at current money values and in making comparisons between different years allowance should be made for changes in the value of money. Estimates of gross national product at constant market prices can be compiled by making use of data on expenditure, and estimates prepared in this way are shown in the last row of Table 238. The figure for 1959 shows an increase of 4.2 per cent compared with 1958. A further substantial increase of 5.4 per cent was recorded in 1960 and in 1961 the increase was 4.6 per cent. The figure for 1962 indicates an increase of 3.1 per cent and the increases were 4.1 per cent in 1963 and 4.5 per cent in 1964 ; the estimated figure for 1965 shows an increase of 2.5 per cent. Over the whole period from 1958 to 1965 the increase in gross national product at constant prices was 32.1 per cent.

The portion of national income arising in the agricultural sector which was $£ 120$ million in 1958, increased to $£ 130$ million in 1959, $£ 133$ million in 1960 , $£ 140$ million in 1961, $£ 144$ million in 1962 but declined to $£ 142$ million in 1963. A substantial increase to $£ 165$ million was recorded in 1964. In 1965 the figure was $£ 166$ million.

Agricultural income constituted 20.2 per cent of the total in 1965 compared with 24.8 per cent in 1958. The proportion contributed by industry increased from 26.7 per cent in 1958 to 30.3 per cent in 1965. For each of the other sectors shown, with the exception of foreign income, the proportion of income arising therein showed only marginal changes. Other net factor income from abroad, however, declined from 6.7 per cent of national income in 1958 to 5.7 per cent in 1965.

## National Expenditure

Personal consumption expenditure at current market prices, increased from $£ 459$ million in 1958 to $£ 673$ million in 1964 and $£ 715$ million in 1965 (Tables 239 and 242). It should be noted that these statistics relate only to consumption by residents, as tourist expenditure in the State, which has been very substantial in recent years and business expenditure on consumption goods and services, are excluded. Expressed at 1958 prices (Table 243) personal consumption was $£ 579$ million in 1964 and $£ 590$ million in 1965. Diagram 1 compares consumption at current and at 1958 prices for the years 1958-65.

Net expenditure by public authorities on current goods and services (Table 239) increased from $£ 70.7$ million in 1958 to $£ 130$ million in 1965.

Gross domestic fixed capital formation which was $£ 79.8$ million in 1958 showed a marked upward trend in subsequent years, the figures for 1964 and 1965 being $£ 172$ million and $£ 193$ million, respectively. The value of the change in the volume of stocks showed increases of $£ 22$ million in 1959, $£ 10 \ddagger$ million in 1960, $£ 8$ million in 1961, $£ 10 \frac{1}{2}$ million in $1962, £ 10 \frac{3}{4}$ million in 1963 , $£ 18 \frac{1}{2}$ million in 1964 , and $£ 22$ million in 1965.

The volume of fixed capital formation to the base $1958=100$, which was 103.6 in 1959 increased considerably each year to reach 196.7 in 1965 (Table 241).

Net expenditure by the rest of the world represents the balance on current account in international payments (Table 245).

## Balance of International Payments

The estimate of the balance of international payments for the year 1965, with comparable figures for each year 1961 to 1964, is shown in Table 245. Reference should be made to the June 1952 issue of the Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin and to the subsequent amendments referred to in the annual articles for particulars of the content of the various items.

The main changes on current account were due to changes in external trade (Section V) and to tourist income, which rose from $£ 43.5$ million in 1961 to $£ 67.7$ million in 1965. On capital account, the external assets of the Central Bank rose by $£ 6.7$ million in $1961, £ 8.5$ million in 1962, $£ 15.1$ million in 1963 and

$£ 28.5$ million in 1964 but fell by $£ 13.9$ million in 1965 . The movement in the net external assets of the commercial banks resulted in credit entries of $£ 13.2$ million in $1963, \npreceq 8.5$ million in 1964 and $£ 4.2$ million in 1965 and debit entries of $£ 7.8$ million in 1961, $£ 3.7$ million in 1962. Purchases and sales of securities by private holders through Irish stockbrokers and banks resulted in a credit figure of $£ 0.3$ million in 1961 a debit figure of $£ 1.0$ million in 1962 , a credit figure of $£ 0.7$ million in 1963, a very small outflow in 1964, and a credit total of $£^{2.2}$ million in 1965.

## Public Finance

The total revenue (i.e. Exchequer Receipts, Table 248) has increased continuously from $£ 129.9$ million in 1959-60 to $£ 240.7$ million in 1965-66 or $£ 21.8$ million in excess of that for the previous year. Receipts from Customs duties, the principal source of revenue, which accounted for 24.2 per cent of total receipts in 1965-66, compared with 25.4 per cent in 1964-65 and 34.6 per cent in 1959-60, increased by $£ 2.6$ million between 1964-65 and 1965-66, while receipts from Excise Duties increased from $£ 42.9$ million in 1964-65 to $£ 49.1$ million in 1965-66. The most important heads of Customs duties in 1964-65 (Table 256) were tobacco; mineral and other hydrocarbon oils; motor cars, parts and accessories; spirits; wines and clothing and apparel, which together accounted for 88 per cent of the total net receipts, tobacco alone yielding 67 per cent.

Receipts from income tax and surtax contributed $£ 54.9$ million or 22.7 per cent of total revenue for 1965-66 compared with f 47.8 million ( 21.8 per cent) in 1964-65 and $£ 23.6$ million ( 18.1 per cent) in 1959-60. The average effective rate of income tax levied on each $£$ of actual income was 2/9 in 1963/64 compared with 2/6 in 1959-60 (Table 259).

Excise duties accounted for 20.3 per cent of the total revenues in 1965-66, for 19.6 per cent in 1964-65, and 18.7 per cent in 1959-60. Net receipts from excise duties on beer and spirits, which in 1964-65 amounted to $£ 20.4$ million or 48 per cent of the total, net excise receipts were $£ 3$ million higher than the 1963-64 figure (Table 254). Exchequer receipts from the Post Office which accounted for 6 to 7 per cent of the total revenue for the years shown in Table 248 , amounted to $£ 16.4$ million in 1965-66. The balance of postal, telegraph and telephone services for 1964-65 (Table 279), showed a deficit of $£ 67,000$ compared with a deficit of $£ 165,000$ in the previous year.

Expenditure (Table 249) has continued to be in excess of Revenue (Table 248) the excess in 1965-66 being $£ 39.9$ million compared with $£ 34.4$ million in 1964-65. Expenditure on Supply Services included issues of $£ 30.1$ million for capital services which were met by borrowing. Excluding these items, the deficit on current account was $£ 7.8$ million. The financing requirements in 1965-66 of the capital programme of public authorities (including public corporations) amounted to $£ 99.7$ million, of which $£ 69.5$ million was provided directly or indirectly by the Exchequer.

Total Liabilities and Assets of the State are set out in Table 251 where it will be seen that both totals have increased in 1965-66. The increase in Liabilities in the year 1965-66 was accounted for by $6 \frac{3}{4} \%$ National Loan 1986/91 $£ 27.5$ million, $6 \%$ Funding Loan $1969 £ 25$ million, National Bonds 1966/77 $£ 1.25$ million, 7\% Sterling Deutsche/Mark Bonds $1981 £ 7$ million, Receipt under Bretton Woods Agreements Act $1957 £ 8.036$ million, and increased Exchequer Bills, while increased Assets were due to repayable advances to the Local Loans Fund and to repayable advances and shares in semi-State bodies.

The total public debt on account of Government stock outstanding (including Savings Certificates and Prize Bonds) was about $£ 413$ million at 31 March, 1966 compared with about $£ 352$ million at 31 March, 1965 (Table 253).

When considering the Liabilities Statement it should be borne in mind that there is double reckoning in the totals representing the investment in Ways and Means Advances to the Exchequer of the proceeds of Dollar Borrowings the balance in the National Development Fund (Winding-up) Account, and part of the assets of the National Loans Sinking Funds and the Savings Certificates Principal Reserve Account. The amount of such double reckoning at 31 March, 1966 was $£ 73.7$ million. This is offset in the Assets Statement where
the balances on these Accounts include their investments in Ways and Means Advances to the Exchequer. Double reckoning occurring in the totals of the Liabilities and Assets Statements for each year ended 31 March was $£ 41.9$ million in 1959; $£ 40.9$ million in 1960; $£ 49.9$ million in 1961, $£ 53.1$ million in 1962; $£ 57.4$ million in 1963; $£ 62.4$ million in 1964, $£ 67.8$ million in 1965 , and $£ 73.7$ million in 1966.

## Local Authorities

The total payments from the Local Taxation Account in aid of local rates, together with other Exchequer payments to Local Authorities in 1964-65 amounted to $£ 40.8$ million or $£ 5.9$ million more than in the preceding year.

The Revenue Accounts of Local Authorities as summarised in Tables 262 and 264 include figures for a limited number of capital works such as road improvements and certain schemes of drainage, etc., the cost of which is met mainly by State grants. The Loan Accounts summarised in Tables 266 and 267 are intended to deal with work of a capital nature such as the construction of houses, the provision of water supplies and sewerage systems, and the erection of hospitals, dispensaries, etc. The money necessary to finance expenditure on these works is obtained principally by borrowing and from State grants supplemented by miscellaneous capital receipts.

Table 262 shows revenue account receipts for the years ended 31 March, 1939 and from 1960 to 1966 the figures for the last year being provisional. Both revenue account receipts and expenditure continue to rise from year to year. Estimated receipts for the year 1965-66 were $£ 95.3$ million and for 1964-65 $£ 84.6$ million, compared with $£ 57.4$ million in 1959-60 and $£ 13.5$ million in 1939. Estimated revenue from rates was $£ 29.7$ million in $1965-66$ and $£ 26.1$ million in 1964-65 compared with $£ 21.4$ million in 1959-60 and $£ 6.3$ million in 1939.

Table 264 shows that revenue expenditure of local authorities was estimated at $£ 94.3$ million in 1965-66 and at $£ 86.3$ million in 1964-65 compared with $\AA 56.4$ million in $1959-60$ and $£ 12.9$ million in 1939. Details of revenue expenditure for the year 1964-65 are given in Table 265.

Estimated loan account receipts and expenditure are shown in Tables 266 and 267 ; loans sanctioned for local authorities in Table 268 and total indebtedness in Table 269. For the year 1965-66 total indebtedness was estimated at $£ 201.4$ million compared with $£ 183.0$ million in the previous year, $£ 147.4$ million in 1959-60 and $£ 32.6$ million in 1939.

## Banking

The Assets (and Liabilities) of the eight associated banks and the National City Bank Ltd., increased in 1965 the average for the December quarter being $£_{742}$ million or $£ 42$ million above the corresponding 1964 figure (Table 271). The principal increases on the Liabilities side were-in current, deposit and other accounts, $£ 23.4$ million within the State and $£ 15.4$ million elsewhere; in other liabilities, $£ 0.1$ million within the State and $£ 1.1$ million elsewhere; in capital paid up, $£ 3$ million within the State. On the assets side there were increases in loans and advances of $£ 8.7$ million within the State; in cash and balances with London agents and other banks of $\AA_{3} .7$ million within the State and $£ 4.3$ million elsewhere; bills Government and other $£ 17.2$ million within the State and $£ 3.7$ elsewhere. There was a decrease in investments of $£ 1.6$ million within the State.

## Post Office

During the calendar year 1965 deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank amounted to $£ 24.2$ million and withdrawals therefrom to $£ 24.4$ million, while the total amount (including interest) standing to credit of all accounts at the close of the year 1965 was $£ 109.9$ million compared with $£ 107.5$ million in 1964 and $£ 82.5$ million in 1959. The average amount standing to the credit of each active account increased from $£ 121$ in 1959 to $£ 144$ in 1965 (Table 285).

## Section XI.-Transport and Communications.

## Railways

All the tables relating to railway operations in this issue of the Statistical Abstract with the exception of Table 296 refer to services operated by Córas Iompair Éireann which is the only concern now operating a rail service in this country. In Tables 291 and 292 the Revenue Accounts and Balance Sheets of Ostlanna Iompair Éireann and Aerlod Teoranta have been consolidated with those of Córas Iompair Éireann. The Hotels Section of Córas Iompair Éireann was taken over by Ostlanna Iompair Éireann Teoranta-a wholly owned subsidiary of Córas Iompair Eireann - on 1 April, 1962. Aerlod Teoranta was formed as a wholly owned subsidiary of Córas Iompair Eireann on 7 July, 1964 to carry on the business of booking and customs clearance agents at Dublin and Shannon Airports. Contributions by the Board of Córas Iompair Éireann to superannuation funds, pensions etc., which are apportioned over the various sections of the Undertaking in Tables 292 and 293 amounted in the current year to £689,243.

The route mileage of railways in operation on 31 March, 1966 was 1,455 miles.

The figures shown in Table 296 for the numbers of employees and wages and salaries paid refer, as in former years, to all railway company employees whose depots or headquarters were within the State. Córas Iompair Éireann accounts for almost all of the staff concerned. Railway companies other than C.I.E. employed 290 ( 7 on railway work) in 1964, 284 ( 5 on railway work) in 1965, and 274 ( 3 on railway work) in 1966. The number of employees showed a decrease each year since 1962. The decrease in 1966 compared with 1965 was reflected mainly in the railway staff but there were also decreases in the number of employees in road motor passenger and goods services and in other ancillary services. Staff employed by Ostlanna Iompair Éireann Teoranta are excluded from the returns since 1963 and account for most of the fall in " other ancillary services" since that year. Staff employed by Aerlod Teoranta are included in the figures for 1965 and 1966. The total wages paid to all railway company employees (exclusive of those in the administrative, managerial etc., category) which had decreased from $£ 214,351$ in 1962 to $£ 211,832$ in 1963 showed an increase in each subsequent year.

## Shipping

The total number of vessels registered at 31 December, 1965 under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 and the Mercantile Marine Act, 1955 was 1,532 with total net tonnage of 95,394 . Of these, 41 were steam vessels with total net tonnage of 20,601 ; 565 were motor vessels, net tonnage 64,861 , and 894 were fishing vessels, net tonnage 6,827 .

During 1965, 10,294 vessels with cargoes, of total net tonnage 10.0 million, entered at Irish Ports from places outside Ireland (Table 298); this represented an increase of 4.2 per cent on the 1964 tonnage. Steam vessels accounted for 28 per cent of the total net tonnage of all ships which entered Irish Ports from places outside Ireland. The proportion of total net tonnage represented by steam vessels had been declining steadily in recent years except in 1961 when a slight increase was recorded. The downward trend continued in 1962 and 1963 but there was a slight increase in 1964 compared with 1963. In 1965, however, the downward trend was again resumed. Total clearances more or less equalled total entrances in 1965 but while 85 per cent of all vessels entered with cargoes, only 61 per cent cleared with cargoes. Although the proportion of all ships which cleared with cargo was slightly lower in 1964 and in 1965 than that for 1963 the proportion for a number of years previously had been increasing steadily and had shown a substantial improvement in 1963 compared with the previous year when only 58 per cent of vessels cleared with cargo.

Table 299, which shows entrances and clearances by countries of clearance or entrance, respectively, reflects to a certain degree the external trade statistics. Classification of vessels by nationality is shown in the second half of this Table, the most important countries (by net tonnage) being Britain, 54 per cent, Ireland, 12 per cent, Netherlands, 11 per cent, and Germany (Federal Republic) 5 per cent. A vessel coming from a port outside Ireland and calling at one or more ports in Ireland is recorded as an "Arrival" at each of these ports, but as an " Entrance " at only one of them. Similarly, a vessel leaving for a port outside Ireland and calling at one or more ports in Ireland is recorded as a " Departure " at each of these ports, but as a " Clearance " at only one of them. Dublin port shows the highest activity by tonnage of arrivals and departures in 1965, Dun Laoghaire (mainly mail boats) being second, Whitegate third and Cobh (mainly trans-Atlantic liners) fourth (Table 300).

## Air Traffic

There was a continued expansion in passenger, mail and freight traffic in 1965 (Table 308). Almost 797,000 passengers (excluding transit traffic) were carried to Ireland by air compared with 727,000 in 1964 ahd 628,000 in 1963, whilst the number of passengers travelling outward from Ireland by air was almost 805,000 in 1965 compared with 736,000 in 1964 and 639,000 in 1963. Inward freight traffic by air which increased from 13,566,000 kilos in 1963 to $15,323,000$ kilos in 1964 showed a further increase to $17,960,000$ in 1965. The corresponding outward freight figures were $11,778,000$ kilos for $1963,13,056,000$ kilos for 1964 and 12,587,000 kilos for 1965. An increase in mail transported inwards by air was recorded in 1965, the amount carried being $1,202,000$ kilos compared with $1,121,000$ kilos in 1964. An increase was also recorded in outward mail traffic by air, the figures being $1,181,000$ kilos in 1965 compared with $1,159,000$ kilos in 1964. About 67 per cent of total passenger traffic, 81 per cent of total mail traffic and 57 per cent of total freight traffic was carried by Aer Lingus (Table 307).

## Roads

Local Authorities are responsible for the maintenance and improvement of over 51,000 miles of public roads. Road expenditure is met out of the local rates collected (Table 263) supplemented by Government Grants, principally charged to the Road Fund (Table 313). The Total expenditure on upkeep and improvement of all roads in the year ended 31 March, 1965 (Tables 315, 316) was 15.1 million. Expenditure on the main (trunk and link) roads amounted to $£ 7.8$ million and on county roads to $£ 6.3$ million, these two categories accounting for 94 per cent of the total expenditure.

There were 281,448 private cars under current licence at Mid-August, 1965, compared with 254,494 in 1964. Private motor cars registered and licensed for the first time in 1965 numbered 43,267 ; of these the most popular types were under 8 horse power $(12,939) 9$ horse power $(9,686)$ and 10 horse power $(9,637)$. Commercial goods vehicles under current licence numbered 48,276 in 1965, while the number of these vehicles registered and licensed for the first time in 1965 was 7,320, compared with 7,560 in 1964. Motor cycles under current licence numbered 51,968 in 1965 compared with 52,173 in 1964. Motor cycles registered and licensed for the first time in 1965 numbered 8,942 compared with 11,227 in 1964.

## Passenger Road Services

In the figures for omnibus passenger road services (exclusive of motor coach services) for 1965 (Table 320) there were decreases of 0.6 million vehicle miles run, 10.1 million passengers carried and $£ 66,000$ in gross receipts compared with the 1964 figures. The operations of Córas Iompair Eireann were affected by a trade dispute which was reflected in generally reduced figures in the Dublin City and suburban and Cork City and suburban services. There were trade disputes also in 1962 and 1963 and consequently the 1964 figures are higher than those for any of the other years shown.

The number of omnibus passenger vehicles under licence in August, 1965 was 1,608 (Table 321). While the number of low-capacity vehicles has tended to fall, the number of larger vehicles (over 32 seats) has increased from 1,324 in August, 1959 to 1,531 in August, 1965.

## Posts, Telegraphs, Telephones and Radio

In the year ended 31 March, 1966, postal matter delivered increased from 365 million pieces in 1964-65 to 366 million pieces in 1965-66. Printed papers accounted for the increase. Figures were not compiled for 1961-62. Registered letters and parcels posted in 1965-66 decreased slightly as compared with 1964-65 (Table 324).

The general downward trend in the use of telegraph services should be interpreted in conjunction with the rapid and continued expansion in telephone services. The number of telephone stations increased from 160,000 in 1961 to 217,000 in 1966, while the number of outward calls increased from 149 million in 1961 to an estimated 216 million in 1966.

Wireless licences current on 31 March, 1961, numbered 490,000. On 31 March 1963, the corresponding number was 363,000 . This number had dropped to 240,000 by 31 March, 1966. On that date, however, there were, additionally 288,000 television licences current.

In 1965 the sound broadcasting time of Radio Eireann was 4,238 hours, compared with 4,194 hours for the previous year (Table 327). Advertising, Music, News in English, General features and Children's features, were the items accounting for the greatest percentage of the total time.

In 1965 the television broadcasting time of Radio Éireann was 2,276 hours, a decrease of 70 hours compared with the previous year. Public Affairs and Religious, Light entertainment, Drama and news, were the items accounting for the greatest percentage of the total time.

## Section XII. Prices

The principal price index numbers are given in this Section and, in addition, actual prices of livestock and other agricultural products are included.

## Retail Prices

In November, 1953 the Consumer Price Index, replacing the Interim Cost of Living Index (Essential Items) which had been in operation since November, 1947, was introduced. The weighting of the new index was based mainly on the results of the Household Budget Inquiry, 1951-52 in which a sample of over 3,000 households in towns and villages throughout the country co-operated in furnishing returns of their total weekly expenditure. Whereas the Interim Index covered only food, clothing, fuel and light and rent, the Consumer Price Index is representative of the trend in prices of all major items of household expenditure. At the time when the new index was introduced a test was made which revealed that if an index based on an " all items " weighting had been in operation in the period August, 1947 to August, 1953, the rise would have been practically the same as took place in the Interim Cost of Living Index (Essential Items). On this account, and to preserve continuity in the retail price index number series, it was decided to link the new Consumer Price Index to the old Interim Index so that the series continued to be given to base August, 1947=100. For technical reasons

it has not been possible to follow a similar procedure in the cases of the individual commodity-group index numbers. These group index numbers are, therefore, given to base August, $1953=100$.

## Agricultural Prices

The annual index of agricultural prices (base $1953=100$ ) is shown in Table 330 and is illustrated in Diagram I. The annual average prices of the more important agricultural products are given in Table 334. Table 335 shows the annual average prices of livestock per head at fairs and marts and Table 336 shows the annual average price per head and per cwt, liveweight of store cattle at Dublin auctions. The average prices per head and per cwt. of bullocks and heifers in certain weight categories at livestock auction marts (excluding Dublin) are given in Table 337. In table 338 the average prices of young pigs per head and per lb . in certain weight groups are given for the first time. The prices are based on returns from six marts in the southern region of the country.

## Wholesale Prices

A new series of Wholesale Price Index Numbers was introduced in the March, 1955 issue of the Irish Trade Journal and Statistical Bulletin and is given in Tables 339 and 340 of this volume. The series is shown to base: year $1953=100$.

The main conceptual difference between the former and the present series is that in its weighting system and in the types of commodities included, the old series was based on the principal of exchange whereas the new series is based on the economic flow principle. According to the exchange principle, the basic weights were the values of commodities exchanged at all stages of production (raw materials, simply transformed materials, more elaborately transformed consumption goods and capital goods ready for use) with adjustments made to eliminate as far as possible double counting, e.g. to ensure that the inclusion of both wheat and flour prices in the system did not accord a double weight to wheat. According to the flow principle, on the other hand, the whole economy is regarded as composed of several economic sectors and the index numbers purport to represent the trend of prices as they affect sellers and purchasers in the sector. According to this concept transactions between members of the same sector are ignored; it is the sector as a whole which is regarded as the transactor. Table 339 shows the index numbers for the various economic flow groups and Table 340 gives the general Index with separate index numbers for each commodity group.

## Import and Domestic Export Prices

The annual import price index increased by 2.3 per cent between 1964 and 1965 while the annual index of domestic export prices increased by 1.2 per cent. As a result the terms of trade index (which is the ratio of the export to the import index multiplied by 100) deteriorated slightly, being (to base: $1953=100$ ) 98.2 in 1965 compared with 99.3 in 1964.

## Stocks and Shares

The price index numbers of Ordinary Stocks and Shares of companies incorporated in Ireland are given in table 342 (base $1953=100$ ).

The average price index numbers for the years 1961-1965 was 187.0, 214.2, $261.3,325.5$ and 316.2 respectively. In 1966 the index number was 305.2 in January, 308.5 in March, 305.8 in June, 276.1 in September and in December, 276.5 averaging 295.1 for the year.

## Section XIII.-Miscellaneous

Among the industrial organisations and the social and other subjects for which particulars are given in this section are-Electricity Supply Board, Bórd na Móna, Bórd Fáilte Éireann, Registered Companies, Insurance, Patents, Building and Co-operative Societies, Expenditure by visitors to Ireland, Receipts of Hotels and Guest Houses, Libraries, Trade Unions, Wage Rates.

## Wage Rates

Table 343 shows the general index of wage rates for twenty-three industrial occupations, for transport and for agriculture: also, for the Dublin District, the table shows wage indices for the three groups-industrial, services, transportand for all groups. The Index numbers for the Dublin District and for the Twentythree Industrial Occupations relate to the beginning of the year and are based on hourly rates. The general index for Transport is based on weekly rates, average wage rates for a week in February being used for passenger road service employees and for a week in March in the case of railway employees. The Agricultural wage index numbers are based on the average minimum weekly rates payable to adult male agricultural workers under the Agricultural Wages (Minimum Rates) Orders and relate to the month of July.

## Electricity

The steadily growing demand for, and the commensurate increase in the production of electric power is reflected in Tables 349 and 353. The 1966 figure of 3,538 million units generated represents an increase of 87 per cent on the generation figure for 1959. Revenue from sales increased from $f_{1} 13.8$ million in the year ended 31 March, 1959 to $£ 24.1$ million in the year ended 31 March, 1966 or by 75 per cent. The average price per unit of electricity sold in 1966 was 1.96 pence, and the corresponding figure for 1959 was 2.14 pence.

The gross revenue of the Board in the accounting year ended 31 March, in 1966 was $£ 24.2$ million; in 1965, $£ 22.6$ million and in $1964, £ 20.4$ million. Working expenses in those years amounted to $£ 13.1$ million in 1966, $£ 12.9$ million in 1965 and $£ 11.3$ million in 1964 (Table 350). In 1966 consumers numbered 716,000 or 21 per cent more than in 1959. Table 351 shows the distribution of units sold by main category of supply. Domestic supply accounted for 1,253 million units or 42 per cent of total units sold. This category increased by 87 per cent since 1959. Industrial motive power supply accounted for 977 million units or 33 per cent of total sales. Industrial supply increased by 105 per cent since 1959 .

Of the total electricity produced, 27 per cent was generated by water, 27 per cent by peat and 47 per cent by coal/oil.

## Turf Production

A production figure of 717,000 tons of machine turf under Bord na Móna's permanent schemes in the year ended 31 March, 1966, represented a decrease of 20 per cent on the previous year's output. Output of milled peat in 1966 at $1,298,000$ tons represented a decrease of 41 per cent on production in 1965. Output of peat moss at 329,000 tons in 1966 represented a decrease of 2 per cent on 1965 production.

The marked decline shown in production of machine turf and milled peat in the year 1961 (Table 354) was due to unfavourable weather conditions.

## Agriculture and Industrial Production

The definitions and classifications used in the Six Counties statistics often differ from those used in this State. Accordingly caution must be exercised in using the figures for comparative purposes.

## Trade

As Great Britain and the Six Counties form a single fiscal unit, Custom " entries" are not required for goods passing between the two areas, therefore values, and even in some cases precise descriptions of goods are not available for Six Counties imports and exports, except in the case of direct trade with places outside Great Britain. The trade figures available are mainly compiled from returns of the "Coastwise" trade with Great Britain furnished by the Harbour Authorities in the Six Counties and from the returns of "Direct " trade furnished by the Board of Customs and Excise. Where more precise statistics are available from other sources (e.g. the export of certain agricultural products) these figures are used in the tables.

The returns furnished by the Harbour Authorities show the gross weight of the goods but provide no information regarding value, which has been assessed on the basis of available data. The Import and Export figures are both overstated by the value of "Transit Trade" which is considerable, as quantities of the produce of the rest of Ireland are exported via Six County ports and the relevant returns do not distinguish between goods which are the produce or manufacture of the Six Counties and those which are not. It should be noted that Re-exports are not separately distinguished and that the Import and Export figures as well as being inflated by the "Transit Trade" include goods which are imported, undergo a process of manufacture in the Six Counties and are subsequently re-exported.

Figures for Parcel Post, stated to be in the region of $£ 20$ million per annum are not included in the tables, except in the case of direct foreign trade.

The statistics have been compiled in accordance with the Standard International Trade Classification and are broadly comparable with trade statistics for other countries using the same classification.
