I beg to submit herewith my Annual Report on Crime for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

PART I.

GENERAL.

The number of indictable offences reported in the year 1945 was 16,786, an increase of 923 on the number for the year 1944. See Appendix A. Section (a).

In Class I. - Offences Against the Person - there was an increase of 68, which is accounted for by an increase of 37 in crimes of Assault, etc., and an increase of 31 in the number of sexual offences against females. One case of abortion was recorded during the year as compared with 18 in the year 1944.

In Class II. - Offences Against Property with Violence - there was an increase of 235 due principally to an increase of 219 in crimes of "Breaking" of which there was an increase of 128 in the number of breakings into shops, warehouses, etc., and of 52 into dwellings. There was a decrease of 26 in crimes of Arson and an increase of 32 in Other Malicious Injuries to Property.

In Class III. - Offences Against Property without Violence - there was an increase of 634. This was accounted for mainly by Larcenies in which there was an increase of 584. In Larcenies in the House to the value of £5, etc., there was an increase of 367, or 83%. In Larcenies from Unattended Vehicles there was an increase of 127 or 25%. In the Larcenies of Pedal Cycles there was a decrease of 69.

In Class IV. - Offences not included in Groups I, II and III. - there was a decrease of 14 which was due to a decrease of 29 in cases of Forgery and Uttering. There was an increase of 11 in cases of Unlawful Possession of Firearms.

Appendix "B" shows by classes the numbers of Indictable Offences reported by each Garda Division and the number and percentage of detections.

ORGANISED CRIMES OF VIOLENCE:

The number of organised crimes of violence reported during the year 1945 was 32, of which 22 were Agrarian. Of the Agrarian crimes 5 were committed in County Limerick, 4 in County Galway, three in County Clare, and 2 in each of the Counties Tipperary and Roscommon.

(Twenty-seven organised crimes of violence were committed in the year 1944, of which 22 were agrarian, and 4 were the outcome of a trade dispute).

JUVENILE OFFENDERS

1

The number of juvenile offenders dealt with for indictable offences in the year 1945 was 2,833, an increase of 33 on the number dealt with in the year 1944. In each of these years, the number of such offenders formed 29% of the persons charged. (See Part III. of this Report).

NON-INDICTABLE OFFENCES

The number of prosecutions for non-indictable offences in the year 1945 was 150,862, an increase of 22,876 on the number in the year 1944. This increase is accounted for principally under (1) The Road Traffic Act, 1933, with a total of 78,854 prosecutions, an increase of 14,375 on the number for the year 1944; (2) Offences in relation to Licensing of Dogs, with a total of 14,398 prosecutions, an increase of 2,829, and (3) Other Road Offences in which there was an increase of 1,660. There was an increase of 333 in Assaults. In prosecutions under the Education and School Attendance Acts there was a decrease of 1,048. In Part IV. of this Report details concerning non-indictable offences are given.

PART II. INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

The total number of indictable offences which became known to the Garda, the number of cases in which proceedings were instituted and the number of persons proceeded against for such offences in each of the years 1938 to 1945 are shown in the following table.

Offences Against the Person:

1

This class of offences consists of Murder, Manslaughter, Wounding, Assault, Intimidation, Cruelty to or Abandoning of Children and Sexual Crime.

The number of offences recorded and the number in which proceedings were taken in each of the years 1938 to 1945 are shown in the following table:-

Murder.

Three murders of persons aged above one year were recorded within the year. Proceedings were instituted in two cases. The third case was one of murder and suicide.

Brief particulars are:-

- 1. Dublin Metropolitan Area: On the 12th January, 1945, the dead bodies of a man and a woman were discovered at the East Pier, Dun Laoghaire. Both bodies had bullet wounds near the heart and a revolver was found beside the bodies.
- 2. County Mayo: On 25th June, 1945, the dead body of a boy aged 8½ years, was found buried under some bushes near his home. He had been missing for 8 days. A Post Mortem examination revealed that death was due to extensive head injuries. A farmer's son was arrested and charged with murder. At the Central Criminal Court on 23rd November, 1945, he was convicted and was sentenced to death. The conviction and sentence were quashed on appeal and a new trial ordered. At the Central Criminal Court on 4th May, 1946, he was found guilty but insane.
- 3. County Monaghan: On 28th September, 1945, an elderly farmer was poisoned and died after eating portion of a sandwich cake which had been left at his home by a neighbouring woman. The woman was charged with the murder and at the Central Criminal Court on 20th February, 1946, she was convicted and was sentenced to death. An appeal against the conviction and sentence was dismissed. The sentence was, however, subsequently commuted to penal servitude for life.

(In 1944 seven murders were recorded. Proceedings were taken in five cases and in one case the perpetrator committed suicide).

Three murders of infants aged one year and under were recorded in the year 1945. Proceedings were taken in two cases.

(One murder of an infant was recorded in 1944).

Attempts to Murder:

Three crimes of Attempted Murder were reported during the year and proceedings were taken in each case.

- l. County Donegal: On 24th August, 1945, at 11.25 p.m. a shot was fired into a bedroom in a Mental Hospital as its occupant was about to retire to bed. He escaped injury. An associate who was an attendant at the hospital, was arrested and charged. At the Central Criminal Court on 29th November, 1945, he was found not guilty and was discharged.
- 2. County Leix: On 25th September, 1945, at 3.40 a.m. a farmer, aged 53 years, discharged a shot from a shot-gun at his wife who escaped injury. At the Circuit Court, Portlaoighise, on 11th December, 1945, he was acquitted by direction of the Judge.
- 3. County Kerry: On 29th October, 1945, a girl aged 15¼ years, attempted to poison her father by putting "Rodine", a rat poison, on some bread which he was about to eat. The family life was an unhappy one and the girl took her mother's side in quarrels with her father, which were of frequent occurrence. At Listowel District Court she was convicted and was ordered to be detained in a Reformatory for 2 years. (Three crimes of Attempted Murder were reported in the year 1944).

Manslaughter:

Fourteen crimes of Manslaughter (other than traffic fatalities) were recorded during the year 1945. Proceedings were taken in all cases and convictions were recorded in eleven cases.

Five crimes of Manslaughter (Traffic Fatalities) were reported during the year. In two cases the persons charged were convicted and the remaining three cases are awaiting trial.

(In the year 1944 the number of cases of manslaughter, other than traffic fatalities, was 13 and the number from traffic fatalities was nil).

Wounding, etc. (Felonies):

Eleven crimes were reported and proceedings were taken in all cases, eight of which resulted in conviction. In a further case the charge was held proved and the defendant dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act. One case is pending.

(In the year 1944, 14 crimes were recorded and proceedings were taken in 12 cases, nine of which resulted in convictions).

Assault, etc. (Misdemeanours):

One hundred and seventy-three crimes were reported during the year, an increase of 37 on the number for 1944. Proceedings were taken in 167 cases and convictions numbered 112. In a further 35 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

(In the year 1944 proceedings were taken in 133 cases. Convictions were recorded in 94 cases and in 18 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied).

Intimidation:

Thirty-four crimes were reported during the year and proceedings were taken in 12 cases. Convictions were recorded in 2 cases and in a further 2 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

(In the year 1944, 31 crimes were recorded and proceedings were taken in 6 cases).

Offences Against Females:

The number of offences against females has increased in each year since 1940. The number for 1945 is the highest recorded during the past 8 years, the figures for which are shown in the following table:

The number of crimes in which convictions were recorded in year 1945 was 113 and in 21 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

Offences Against Property with Violence:

Included in this group are crimes of Burglary, Housebreaking, Robbery and Malicious Injury to Property.

The total number of offences recorded in this class and the number and percentage of cases in which proceedings were instituted in each of the years 1938 to 1945 are shown in the following table:-

The increase in the number of Breakings into Dwellinghouses was 52 and into Shops, Warehouses, etc., 128. There was an increase of 16 in the number of Attempts to Break into Houses, Shops, etc., and an increase of 14 in the number of cases of Entering with Intent to commit felony.

Robbery.

Thirty-two cases of Robbery were reported during the year, which is one less than the number for 1944. Proceedings were taken in 19 cases, 12 of which resulted in conviction and in 2 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

Arson and Other Malicious Injuries to Property:

The number of cases of Malicious Damage to Property reported in 1945 was 387, an increase of 9 on the number for 1944. There was a decrease of 26 in crimes of Arson, the number for 1945 being 53, decrease of 26 in 1944. Proceedings were taken in 177 cases within compared with 79 in 1944. Proceedings were taken in 177 cases within the period and convictions numbered 86, while the charges in a further 57 cases were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied. 57 cases were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

Offences Against Property Without Violence:

The offences recorded in this group are Larceny, Embezzlement, Obtaining Goods by False Pretences, Frauds and Receiving Stolen Goods.

The marked and sustained increase in larcenies since 1942 is regarded as unsatisfactory. 62% of the total number of larcenies was reported from the Dublin Metropolitan Division. Over 40% of these larcenies could have been prevented if the owners took reasonable precautions to ensure the safety of owners took reasonable precautions to ensure the safety of property such as pedal cycles, property in unattended vehicles, property such as pedal cycles, property in unattended vehicles, clothing left on clothes lines at night, ladies' handbags in dance halls and churches, overcoats in hotels, restaurants, halls of houses, etc. The prevention of larcenies of this kind and their detection is an extremely difficult task for the police.

Embezzlement:

1

92 offences were reported in 1945, an increase of 34 on the number for 1944. Proceedings were taken in 82 cases, convictions were recorded in 43 and in 28 the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

Obtaining Goods by False Pretences:

The number of these offences showed little change in 1945, the total being 416, as against 428 in 1944.

Proceedings were taken in 329 cases and resulted in 189 convictions and 72 charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

Other Offences not included in the foregoing classes:

Forgery and Uttering:

45 offences were reported in 1945, a decrease of 29 on the number in 1944. Proceedings were taken in 31 cases and convictions were recorded in 13 cases.

Attempted Suicide:

1

35 offences were reported in 1945, a decrease of 4 on the number for the year 1944.

Value of Property Stolen and Recovered:

In 1945 the value of property reported as stolen was £102,910, of which property valued at £38,286 was recovered. (In the year 1944 the value of property stolen was £88,553, of which property valued £35,311 was recovered):

In Offences against Property with Violence, i.e. Burglary, Housebreaking and Sacrilege, the value of property reported stolen in the year 1945 was £35,934, of which £9,764 was recovered. (In the year 1944 the corresponding figures were £29,283 and £10,854.)

In offences of Larceny, property valued £66,975 was taken and £28,521 was recovered, as compared with £59,270 taken in 1944 and £22,456 recovered.

Sex and Age of Persons Convicted of Indictable Offeaces:

The number of persons convicted of Indictable Offences in 1945 was 4103, of whom 3483 were males and 620 females. The number convicted by Courts of Summary Jurisdiction was number convicted by Courts and 524 females - and the number convicted by Circuit and Higher Courts was 610 - 514 males and 96 females (See Appendix D, Section a).

Proceedings in Cases of Indictable Offences Undetected in the Year 1944:

During the year 1945 proceedings were instituted in respect of 69 Indictable Offences committed in the year 1944, which were undetected at the end of that year. Convictions were recorded in 42 cases and the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied in 11 cases. One case is awaiting trial and one is pending in the District Court. 68 persons were charged in connection with those proceedings and 39 of them were convicted. The charges against a further 15 were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied. One is awaiting trial and one is pending in the District Court (See Appendix G. Section (b).)

The number of indictable offences cleared up in the year 1945 was 9,076 which is shown in Columns 3 and 17 of Appendix A Section (a) in relation to offences committed in 1945 and in Columns 2 and 16 of Appendix G, Section (b) in relation to offences reported in 1944 but not detected in that year.

The percentage of cases cleared up in 1945 was 54% and in 1944 - 55%.

Proceedings for Indictable Offences pending from Year 1944 - Results:

In Return A. for the year 1944 the number of cases shown as pending was 286. Of this number 276 have been disposed of and 9 cases are still pending. In one case the offender absconded and has not since been traced. Convictions were recorded in 100 cases and in 123 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied. (See Appendix G Section (a).)

PART III.

JUVENILES CHARGEL WITH INDICTABLE OFFENCES:

Returns relating to Juvenile Offenders charged with indictable offences are shown in appendices E and F.

The number of persons under 18 years who were dealt with in 1945 for the commission of indictable offences was 2,833, an increase of 33 on the number for the year 1944.

There was an increase of 118 in the number charged with Housebreaking and a decrease of 130 in the number charged with Larcenies (not exceeding £5. in value).

The numbers of offenders, male and female, dealt with in the years 1939, 1943, 1944 and 1945 under the various crime headings are shown in the following table:-

Sex and Age of Offenders:

In regard to the age groups of persons charged there is a slight decrease when compared with the 1944 figures in the number of males in the 16-18 group and there are increases in the numbers charged in the remaining three groups, the biggest being in the 14-16 group with an increase of 48;

The number of females charged shows an increase of 18 in the 12-14 years group and decreases in the remaining groups, as compared with the 1944 figures.

Vagrancy Laws:

Prosecutions for offences under the Vagrancy Acts in 1945 numbered 1,107. Convictions were recorded in 646 cases and in 310 cases the

charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

Under this head Begging is the most frequent offence and of the total of 1107 prosecutions 795 were in respect of this charge. Convictions numbered 507 and the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied in 223 cases.
