Statement of Board Responsibilities

Donegal Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

Section 51 of that Act requires the Education and Training Board to keep in such form and in respect of such accounting periods as may be approved by the Minister for Education with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure, NDP Delivery and Reform, all proper and usual accounts of the monies received or expended by it.

In preparing those accounts, the Board is required to:

- (a) apply the standard accounting policies for the preparation of Education and Training Board financial statements
- (b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- (c) disclose and explain any material departures from the standard accounting policies.

The Board is responsible for keeping proper books of account which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Board and which enable it to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with section 51 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

The Board is also responsible for safeguarding its assets and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Statement on Internal Control

Donegal Education and Training Board (ETB) came into being on 1st July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. On that date, Donegal Education and Training Board took over the Assets, Liabilities and functions of the former County Donegal Vocational Education Committee. With effect from 1st July 2014 Donegal Education and Training Board took over from SOLAS, the assets, liabilities and the management of the activities of their Training Centres.

The Code of Practice for the Governance for Education and Training Boards is set out in Circular Letter 002/2019, which was issued by the Department of Education to all Education and Training Boards in January 2019. This Code was adopted by Donegal Education and Training Board at its meeting on 8th February 2019.

A new Board was constituted for Donegal Education and Training Board in September 2019, and at its meeting of 21st October 2019, the Board completed the appointment of new Finance and Audit and Risk Committees.

Responsibility for the System of Internal Control

As Chairperson of Donegal Education and Training Board, I acknowledge the responsibility of the Board for ensuring that an efficient, effective and economic system of internal control is maintained and operated. The system can only provide reasonable, and not give absolute assurance that, assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected in a timely period.

Key Control Procedures

The Board has taken steps to ensure an appropriate control environment by:

- · Clearly defining management and staff responsibilities.
- · Establishing procedures for reporting significant control failures and ensuring appropriate corrective actions.

• Establishing a formal risk management system involving procedures for identifying and evaluating all risks which could prevent Donegal Education and Training Board from achieving its objectives.

The system of internal control operated in Donegal Education and Training Board is based on:

- Detailed administrative procedures.
- · Segregation of duties.
- · Specific authorisations.
- Internal checks.

Monthly management review of reports outlining the actual and budgeted results of programmes operated by
Donegal Education and Training Board.

The Boards Oversight Framework includes:

The Board's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the:

- . The Chief Executive, who has responsibility for the internal control framework.
- Recommendations made by the Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General in management letters or other reports.
- · Recommendations made by the Internal Audit Unit ETBs.
- · Work of the Audit and Risk Committee and the Finance Committee.

Audit and Risk Committee

The Board's oversight of the system of internal control is informed by the work of the Audit and Risk Committee (ARC) who met four times in 2022. The work programme of the ARC included consideration of:

- · Internal audit reports.
- External audit reports and the management letters of the Comptroller and Auditor General (C & AG).
- Annual Financial Statements.
- Risk Management Updates.
- · Risk Register.
- · Compliance Assessment Tool.

• A report from the Director of Organisation Support and Development on a review of the internal controls template for 2022.

· Opinion report to the Board as to the adequacy and appropriateness of the systems of internal control.

At the request of the ARC, the Chief Executive, Director of OSD, Head of Finance, Head of Information Technology, Head of Corporate Services, and Head of Procurement all attended various meetings of the ARC during 2022 and/or 2023, at which they provided reports to the ARC on the operation of controls, risk management and finances.

The Audit and Risk Committee reviewed the effectiveness of the system of internal controls for the relevant reporting period on 21 February and 20 March 2023.

Statement on Internal Control

Finance Committee

The Board's oversight of the system of internal control is also informed by the work of the Finance Committee who met four times in 2022. The work programme of the Finance Committee included consideration of:

- Annual Financial Statements 2022 (AFS).
- Recommendation to the Board of Annual Financial Statements for 2022.
- Monthly Pay and Non-Pay returns.

The Chief Executive, Director of OSD and Head of Finance reported to the Finance Committee in 2022.

The Finance Committee reviewed the Annual Financial Statements 2022 on 20 March 2023 and recommended their adoption to the Board.

Internal Audit

An internal audit service is provided by the Internal Audit Unit - Education and Training Boards (IAU-ETB), who provide an overall opinion on areas audited. The opinion is based on the findings identified during the audit and the range of possible opinions is as follows:

Comprehensive: System of internal control is adequate and operated effectively **Adequate:** System of internal control is generally adequate and operates effectively **Inadequate:** System of internal control is inadequate and does not operate effectively

The following internal audit reports were received in the period from the 01 January 2022 - 31 December 2022: A Review of Previous Audit Recommendations was carried out in 2020 and 2021. The finalised report was received from IAU-ETBs in February 2022 and was presented to the Audit and Risk Committee on 24th February 2022. The overall finding of the report was that there was a comprehensive system of controls in place. A total of 29 recommendations were reviewed - 20 recommendations were deemed to have been fully implemented, 6 were deemed to have been partially implemented, and 3 were deemed to be not implemented.

An Audit of Certain Human Resources Processes was carried out in 2021 and 2022. The finalised report was received from IAU-Education and Training Boards in December 2022 and presented to the Audit and Risk committee on 21st February 2023. The overall finding of the report was that there was an adequate system of controls in place. A total of 8 recommendations were made – 2 high, 4 medium and 2 low. Donegal Education and Training Board is in the process of implementing these recommendations.

The following internal audit reviews took place in the period from the 01 January 2022 - 31 December 2022:

· Leases, Travel and Subsistence, Gifts and Hospitality - audit is in progress but has not yet been completed.

· Youth Services - audit is in progress but has not yet been completed.

Review of Previous Audit Findings from the Review of Contracted Training - audit is in progress but has not yet been completed.

Implementation of Previous Audit Findings relating to Procurement Compliance - audit is in progress but has not yet been completed.

Breaches of System of Internal Control - Procurement

Donegal Education and Training Board is continuing to work towards meeting all its responsibilities in respect of procurement regulations.

There are instances where goods and services are procured across over 32 sites through competitive procurement processes, in line with Donegal Education and Training Board's Procurement Policy, but the cumulative value across all sites exceeds National/EU tendering thresholds. The complexity of having two separate finance systems, one for Head Office, Post Primary Schools, Further Education, and other areas of activity, with a separate one for Training, also causes difficulties in enabling Donegal Education and Training Board to comply with its obligations. Donegal Education and Training Board to a single finance system and this project was successfully concluded in February 2023. This should assist Donegal Education and Training Board to improve its compliance with procurement requirements going forward.

Statement on Internal Control

Breaches of System of Internal Control - Procurement

Based on an analysis of 2022 expenditure in areas where an organisation-wide eTenders process is appropriate, regular expenditure totalling €375,508 (ex. VAT) (2021: €313,581) has been identified as non-compliant. Further detail on non-compliant expenditure is set out below:

(i) Expenditure of €31,806 on ICT equipment. Donegal Education and Training Board was unable to avail of OGP central frameworks due to supply issues attributable to the Covid 19 pandemic and the war in Ukraine. The need to ensure the availability of appropriate ICT equipment when needed for teaching, learning and administration, has required Donegal Education and Training Board to go outside of tendered suppliers to meet these needs on a timely basis.

(ii) Expenditure of €59,753 on furniture purchases and stationery. OGP put a new contract in place for stationery from January 2021 but the OGP framework did not meet all the stationery needs of Donegal Education and Training Board. Most of the non-compliance related to office and classroom furniture. OGP do not currently have a tender in place to meet these requirements. Donegal Education and Training Board put a framework for the provision of office and classroom furniture in place in June of 2022 and plan to put a framework for stationery in place in Q2 of 2023 as the OGP tender ended in December 2022.

(iii) Expenditure totalling €217,540 paid to four different companies on apprenticeship class materials. Donegal Education and Training Board (DETB) went to tender for one type of material involved (electrical cabling) in 2021 as a trial for this type of product, but the tender has encountered a number of issues. Donegal Education and Training Board are currently exploring alternative options to improve compliance in this area and aim to have a solution in place by the end of 2023.

(iv) Expenditure totalling €66,409 on print and design work. OGP put a dynamic purchasing system in place for this service in 2021. However there are no providers in our region. Donegal Education and Training Board met with OGP in 2022 to review the OGP offering where it was established that the OGP tender could not meet our needs. Donegal Education and Training Board have put in place a procurement process for these services to ensure compliance and a tender award was made in Q1, 2023.

Donegal Education and Training Board has developed a Corporate Procurement Plan for 2022/23, which sets out actions to address areas of identified non-compliance and other Donegal Education and Training Board procurement needs. Donegal Education and Training Board will continue to monitor and review all areas of expenditure to identify opportunities where tendering and the utilisation of existing National Frameworks for goods and services will provide best value for money and meet compliance requirements.

Due to the diverse nature of business provision and high level spends across Donegal Education and Training Board, it is not possible to achieve full procurement compliance at all times whilst simultaneously meeting the needs of the organisation. Suitable OGP Frameworks are not always available and, at times, do not meet the needs of Donegal Education and Training Board. Therefore, Education and Training Boards, through the support of Education and Training Boards Ireland, collaborate to achieve efficiencies by identifying common areas of procurement across all Education and Training Boards. Economies of scale and efficiencies can be achieved in this way however, a longer process and lead time is required. The Procurement Network Group and the Working Groups associated with same, which are made up of procurement representatives from various Education and Training Boards, take on this role on the sector's behalf.

Donegal Education and Training Board is also mindful of supporting SMEs and in particular those in the local communities of Schools and Centres where value for money often outweighs that of larger OGP contracted suppliers when it comes to price, quality, and timeliness of delivery and returns. In addition, Donegal Education and Training Board is committed to its responsibilities around the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, therefore sourcing local suppliers reduces our carbon footprint.

Statement on Internal Control

Fraud

No incidents were reported under Donegal Education and Training Boards Anti-Fraud and Corruption Policy in 2022.

Protected Disclosures

Donegal Education and Training Board received no protected disclosures in 2022 under the Protected Disclosure Act 2014.

Risk Management

Donegal Education and Training Board has a Corporate Risk Management system in place across the organisation. The Corporate Risk Register has been reviewed by both the Education and Training Board Executive and the Audit and Risk Committee, and the Committee will continue to monitor Risk Management on an ongoing basis. Donegal Education and Training Board updated its risk management policy during 2022. The continued absence of a dedicated Compliance Officer to lead out and support the increasingly important area of Risk Management remains a matter of concern.

Issues progressing at Sectoral level

Single Public Service Pension Scheme (SPSPS)

Circular Letter 11/2014 obliges Education and Training Boards to provide benefit statements and calculations to members of the SPSPS by the end of June of the following year. Donegal Education and Training Board has met its obligations under this circular as all member statements have been issued for the period 31 December 2013 up to and including 31 December 2021. The Pensions Department is currently in the process of preparing benefits statements for members of the SPSPS up to 31 December 2022. These statements should be completed and issued by 30 June 2023.

Payroll Shared Services

The Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) centre has been established to deliver shared services for the Education and Training sector. The Chief Executive has confirmed that she has fulfilled her responsibilities in relation to the requirements of both the Memorandum of Understanding and also the Service Management Agreement that has been signed and is in place between Donegal Education and Training Board and the Department of Education - ESBS centre. These documents provide the framework for the operation of ESBS-Education and Training Board Payroll Shared Services on behalf of the Education and Training Board sector. The Chief Executive relies on a letter of assurance from the Accounting Officer of the Department of Education that appropriate controls are exercised in the provision of payroll services by the ESBS to Donegal Education and Training Board.

Payroll

The migration of Donegal Education and Training Board for all staff to ESBS is planned to take place in quarter 1 of 2024.

Expenses including Travel and Subsistence

A schedule is being developed for Education and Training Boards to migrate Expenses to ESBS during 2023/2024 including Donegal Education and Training Board.

Apprentice Payroll

Donegal Education and Training Board transitioned their apprentice payroll to the managed payroll service set up by ESBS in March 2020.

Learner Payments

Donegal Education and Training Board have transitioned their learner payments to the managed service provided by ESBS in two waves. Wave 1 in August 2020 and Wave 2 (Youthreach and VTOS) in February 2022.

Finance Shared Services

The Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) has been established to deliver shared services in the Education and Training sector with a focus on delivering payroll and finance shared services for Education and Training Boards in the first instance. This solution is now being used by 15 of the 16 Education and Training Boards with a project being progressed to migrate CD Education and Training Board in January 2024. Plans are being put in place to migrate the first two Education and Training Boards (Cavan and Monaghan and Cork Education and Training Boards) to full finance shared services in 2023.

Following the transfer of Training Services in 2014, Donegal Education and Training Board operated two Financial Management Systems (FMS). The two systems have been consolidated into a single FMS as part of the preparation for the migration to Finance Shared Services. Donegal Education and Training Board began the process of consolidating the two systems in September 2022 and the process was completed in February 2023.

Statement on Internal Control

Resource / Restructuring Needs

The Board has a real concern at the lack of progress in the implementation of the Organisational Design (Phase 2) Project. There is an ever-growing need for approval for appropriate and adequate Further Education & Training (FET), Schools Administration and OSD services for Donegal Education and Training Board, including an appropriate and agreed organisational structure with an adequate complement of staff in each functional area. A comprehensive Overview and Priorities document was submitted via Education and Training Board Ireland to DES in June 2017 outlining the changes to the administrative functions of Education and Training Boards following the amalgamation of VECs to Education and Training Boards and the transfer and assimilation of the former FÁS Training functions. There are clearly identified needs for a range of new roles and work units in the following areas: ICT, Health & Safety, Compliance, Estates Management, Procurement, HR Pensions and Recruitment, Treasury Management, Health & Wellbeing, Climate Action and Sustainability, Schools Administration and FET. This lack of adequate resourcing and structures leads to difficulties in providing service continuity, feelings of insecurity among staff and difficulties in recruitment. Further details on some of these matters are included below. Restructuring needs have also been identified. Currently, Estates Management/Building Services resides within Corporate Services while Procurement resides within Finance. There is an identified need to have both these functions established as stand-alone Sections under OSD as proposed in our Organisational Design Phase 2 submission.

The Board and Audit and Risk Committee have expressed serious concerns over several years now in relation to the areas of Health and Safety and ICT in particular. Resource allocations and levels in these areas are not appropriate for the level of responsibility and the inherent risks involved.

(a) Health & Safety

Donegal Education and Training Board does not currently have a dedicated Health & Safety Officer and Section to manage and control the implementation and compliance with Health & Safety legislation and requirements in respect of its huge number and range of properties, its 17,500 learners and over 1,400 staff. There is an identified need for a full-time dedicated Health & Safety Officer together with appropriate support staff, as proposed in our Organisational Design Phase 2 submission, to achieve full compliance with legislation in this area and address fully all matters raised by internal audit. The situation with Covid-19 has only served to heighten requirements in this already under-resourced area.

(b) Inadequate IT systems and Resources

As advised in the 2020 Letter of Representation, and in the light of the Inadequate Opinion Report arising from the ICT Internal Audit, our Head of ICT is continuing, with the assistance of additional dedicated ICT staffing resources, to address and implement the recommendations contained in the report which are within our capacity. Given the increasing demands on our ICT resources due to the prevalence of ICT as a key tool across the organisation's Schools, Centres and Offices, as well as the ever-increasing risks and threats in the area of cyber security, Donegal Education and Training Board will continue to make a business case for additional dedicated ICT staffing resources. While an additonal ICT post at APO level was received in 2021 and is very welcome, there is still the need for significant further investment to adequately address the ICT resources required to address the serious risks faced in the area of ICT.

Covid-19 Pandemic

Assessments of the impact of Covid-19 were carried out and Donegal Education and Training Board is satisfied that compliance with existing policies, procedures and workflows continued in the hybrid working environment. The Administrative Services Business Continuity Plan was put in place to ensure the continued delivery of services. Regular update, monitoring and review meetings were held to ensure full compliance with pre-existing operational and legislative requirements was maintained. A Covid-19 Response Team was put in place consisting of Senior Management staff from OSD, FET, and Schools to address ongoing issues arising from Covid-19 and to consider any guidance issued by Education and Training Board Ireland, the Department of Education, SOLAS, and other stakeholders. Donegal Education and Training Board is satisfied that there was no significant impact on the internal control environment as a result of the measures put in place to deal with Covid-19.

Management also took into account the Audit Insights document dealing with Covid-19 issued by the Comptroller and Auditor General in September 2020, and this document was brought to the attention of all management of Donegal Education and Training Board and this was taken into account in the updating of the risk registers. Donegal Education and Training Board also completed the accompanying questionnaire to address all questions raised as to the potential effects of the Covid-19 pandemic on the system of internal control. This document was again reviewed for the 2022 year and no significant changes were noted.

Statement on Internal Control

Annual Review of Controls

Donegal Education and Training Board is committed to operating an efficient, effective and economic internal control system. I confirm that the Audit & Risk Committee at its meetings on 21 February 2023 and 20 March 2023, conducted a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control for the year ended 31st December 2022 in the manner prescribed by the Code of Practice for the Governance of Education and Training Boards.

This included:

• The Executive presented a report of its review of controls (both verbally and in written report) at its meeting of 20 March 2023. The Audit & Risk Committee also got confirmation from the Chief Executive that on balance the system of internal control is adequate and appropriate insofar as is reasonably practicable. The Chief Executive based this statement on information gathered from senior managers across the organisation.

• A review of internal and external audit reports issued in 2022 and to date in 2023, met with representatives from the C&AG and the IAU-ETB, along with an examination of minutes of meetings of the Board and Finance Committee to ensure there are no inconsistencies in these with the assessment of internal control provided to the Audit and Risk Committee in Internal Audit Reports and Management representations.

• The Audit & Risk Committee presented a report (verbally and by written report) on the review of controls to the Board on the 30 March 2023.

• A review of Governance and Control activities in 2022 including:

o Engagement between the Audit and Risk Committee, Finance Committee, Board and the Executive.

o Reports from the Chief Executive, Director of Organisation Support and Development (OSD), Director of Schools and Director of Further Education and Training (FET) to the Board.

o Reports from the Chief Executive, Director of Organisation Support and Development (OSD), Head of Finance, Head of Corporate Services, Head of ICT, Head of Human Resources and the Area Training Manager to the Audit and Risk Committee.

o Recommendations made by the C&AG in management letters or other reports.

o Recommendations made by the Internal Audit Unit.

o Risk Management Reports from the Director of Organisation Support and Development.

o The Risk Register is kept up to date and presented to the Audit & Risk Committee on a regular basis.

Responsibilities of Board Members

As detailed in the statement of Board responsibilities, the Board members are responsible for

Responsibilities of the Comptroller and Auditor General

I am required under the Education and Training Boards Act 2013 to audit the financial statements of Donegal Education and Training Board and to report thereon to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

My objective in carrying out the audit is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud or error. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. In doing so,

 I identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements whether due to fraud or error; design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks; and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact.

Reporting on other matters

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted.

I seek to obtain evidence about the regularity of financial transactions in the course of audit. I report if I identify any material instance where public money has not been applied for the purposes intended or where transactions did not conform to the authorities governing them.

Notes to the Financial Statements - Year Ended 31 December 2022

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Significant Accounting Policies

The basis of accounting and significant accounting policies adopted by Donegal Education and Training Board are set out below. They have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

1.2 General Information

Donegal Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 and its functions are set out in section 10 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

1,3 (a) Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are presented in the form approved by the Minister for Education with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure, NDP Delivery and Reform. They consist of an Operating Statement, a Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities and notes to the Financial Statements including Accounting Policies.

(b) Revenue and Expenditure Recognition

Revenue

Oireachtas grants and other grants are recognised on a cash basis. Other receipts are recognised on a cash basis.

Expenditure

Pay

Pay Expenditure is recognised on a cash basis. Pay represents remuneration to employees including ER PRSI.

Non Pay

Non Pay expenditure is recognised on a cash basis. Non pay expenditure is comprised of administration and operational expenses.

Allowances

Allowance expenditure is recognised on a cash basis. Allowances are paid to learners who are undertaking specified further education and training programmes funded by SOLAS.

The Operating Statement is presented by cash receipts and cash payments per programme grouping. The cash surplus/(deficit) is adjusted for movement in Current Assets (excl.Bank) and Current Liabilities to give an overall result for the year on an accrual basis.

(c) Assets and Liablities Recognition

The Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities is prepared on the accruals basis by determining state grant and other funder balances at amounts that reflect the related receipts received and expenditure incurred and in accordance it the funding rules.

Recurrent State Grants

These grants constitute the core funding to the Education and Training Board.

Capital Grants

These grants are used to meet building, infrastructure, property acquisitions and refurbishment costs, and in specified circumstances may be used to fund fixtures, fittings, equipment and furniture.

Other Recurrent Income

Agency and Self-financing Projects

Agency work involves running a programme on behalf of another organisation or students according to agreed criteria and the Education and Training Board is reimbursed its cost.

Self-financing Projects are programmes run under the complete control of the Education and Training Board either for the Education and Training Board or another organisation.

Other Assets and Llabilities

Third Party Debtors are included in Current Assets. Pay and Expense Liabilities are included in Current Liabilities.

Comparatives

Where necessary, the comparative figures for the previous year have been restated on the same basis as those for the current year.

Notes to the Financial Statements - Year Ended 31 December 2022

1 Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Tangible Fixed Assets

All tangible fixed assets purchased including building, infrastructure, property acquisitions, refurbishment costs, fixtures, fittings, equipment and furniture are expensed in the year of purchase. State grants to fund the purchase of tangible fixed assets are recognised in the same year.

(e) Stocks

All consumable stocks are expensed as purchased.

(f) Superannuation

The pension entitlements of Education and Training Board staff, including those who transferred from SOLAS, are conferred under defined benefit schemes. Staff employed since 2013 are included in the Single Public Service Pension Scheme and monthly payments are made to the Department of Public Expenditure, NDP Delivery and Reform.

Superannuation deductions made from employees' pay in respect of the schemes are retained by the Education and Training Board as part of agreed Exchequer funding, or paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure, NDP Delivery and Reform.

The Education and Training Board does not make any contributions towards the schemes.

These unfunded schemes are operated on a pay as you go basis with the annual pension entitlements being paid by the National Shared Services Office on behalf of the Education and Training Board. Education and Training Board's are responsible for the administration of their gensions, Pension funds are provided by the Department of Education.

Provision has not been made in the financial statements for the present cost of the future benefits that have accrued to staff members and existing pensioners under these schemes.

(g) Lease Rentals

All lease rentals are expensed as incurred.

31 Contingencies

Donegal Education and Training Board are currently involved in a number of litigations, the outcome of which cannot be determined at this time.

32 Additional Superannuation Contributions

The Education and Training Board does not make pension contributions in respect of employees. Since 2013 all new entrants are obliged to join the Single Public Pension Scheme.

From 1 January 2019 onwards, members of public service defined benefit pension schemes pay an additional superannuation contribution (ASC) arising from the Public Service Stability Agreement (2018-2020) and the Public Service Pay and Pensions Act 2017. ASC is a permanent contribution in respect of pensionable remuneration. The Education and Training Board deducted Additional Superannuation Contributions from employees amounting to €1,944,676 (2021 €1,699,328) which were remitted to the Department of Education.

39 The Impact of COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic developed rapidly in 2020 and its impact has continued throughout 2022. Measures taken by our government to contain the virus have affected how we operate. Donegal Education and Training Board has taken a range of measures to monitor and mitigate the effects of COVID-19 including putting in place required safety and public health measures for our staff, student participants and beneficiaries such as social distancing and working from home. Notwithstanding the impact of COVID-19, Donegal Education and Training Board continues to carry out its vital role in education and training with a focus on ensuring continuity of education for learners, including a particular focus on more vulnerable students.

Since March 2020 the pandemic has had a financial implication for Donegal Education and Training Board and we have received additional resources in the form of government grants to assist us in continuing in our role.

- In 2022 we received the following additional COVID 19 related funding Department of Education - COVID-19 Capitation funding supports - €404,631
 - Department of Education- COVID-19 Additional Supervision Arrangements- €396,200
 - Department of Education- COVID-19 Combined Cleaning Supports €257,532 SOLAS- COVID-19 FET overheads- €220,484
- Increased Student access supporting Mitigating Educational Disadvantage Fund (MEADF) €280,000

This additional grant assistance provided funding across a range of areas of expenditure arising from the pandemic such as:

- Minor Works including classroom reconfiguration
- Additional Short term COVID related leases
- Software licences and IT equipment

Donegal Education and Training Board has taken the following steps to manage and mitigate the effects of the pandemic on its operation

Donegat Education and Training Board engaged its business continuity plan to ensure that its operations continued as normal in line with its regulatory requirements

The Audit and Risk Committee reviewed the updated risk register to take account of the specific risks arising from COVID-19 and Donegal Education and Training Board developed and implemented additional control measures as required

The Department of Education and Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science put in place a range of steering and engagement structures to support the education and training system in navigating the challenges of COVID-19. Donegal Education and Training Board is participating in these structures to ensure a joined-up approach across the education sector

In 2023 we will continue to follow the various government policies and advice and, in parallel, we will do our utmost to continue our vitat role in the best and safest way possible. Within the further education and training sector, Education and Training Board's will continue to play an important role in the response to upskilling and reskilling those adversely impacted by the pandemic.
